

I crossed the creek and ran right through them before I saw I then turned and ran back hem. through them and crossed the creek again. By this time the Indians were on their horses and after me. I had out run my father and Harris something like a half mile and was very close to the Indians. When I met my father and Harris the Indians could out run their horses. I kept trying to run off but every time I would get a little ahead of my father and Harris an Indian Chief, riding a good gray pony, would try to cut me off. He made several attempts to catch my bridle rein. The Indians wanted me for the ransom they might get for me. After the fight had been going on for about a mile we got in a live oak thicket. Here the Indians quit us and started back to their horses. Our men heard the shooting and holloing and were coming to us when they met the Indians three or four hundred yards from where they left us. As soon as we heard the shooting and yelling we left the thicket and went to them. There were fifteen Indians and nine white men and myself in this fight. The \otimes fight continued for about a mile and Jim Reed and an Indian were killed. The Indians took their dead man off with them. The night we left home on this





had!

If within all the length and breadth of Midland County there are any oats barley, or alfalfa, the Chamber of Commerce wants it mighty badly. Unless some of these products can be obtained, the Midland exhibits at the Dallas State Fair and West Texas Fair at Abilene will be penalized as high as 75 points, which means Midand will come near the bottom of the list of exhibitors.

Two bundles of alfalfa are needed. Two gallons of oats, or two gallons of barley, and two bundles of each are needed. The Chamber of Commerce distributed oat and barley seed last fall, but none of these crops did 🐼 well. Any person knowing the where abouts of any of these products is asked to bring them in or notify the county farm agent or secretary at once.

"Midland Gets Benefit From Oil Field." Midland, Aug. 31-Here is a place that has no oil production within 30 or 40 miles, yet is a real oil town. At this writing Midland is substantially benefitted from discoveries of oil in Upton and Crane Counties; knows it, appreciates it, and expects to make itself a permanent supply base as prospecting on the West Texas plateau extends farther and farther from the Orient railroad. Midland is 42 miles north of the Gulf's McEllroy well in Crane County, and 70 miles from the Hurdle pool. Distances however, are small factors in West Texas, and Midland has blowed itself to a direct connection with the Upton-Crane fields by building a graded road, free of brush and mile marked all the way. The road represents a fine bit of co-operation between the Midland, Mc-Camey and Odessa Chambers of Commerce

Midland really has two roads leadng into the oil fields. The other is a straight line to Rankin 55 miles ong, on which state highway designation has been asked, and lightning fast on the Midland County end.

Oil Money In Banks Her strategic location, with a consequent steady sale of supplies to the oil fields, has put \$200,000 new money into the two Midland banks, giving them the largest deposits in the town's history-more than \$1,000,-000, greater than ever during 1919 cattle boom. Oil has brought more than 100 new comers to Midland, looking for office space and homes to rent. There isn't a vacant house in town. Nine oil scouts have taken up permanent residence there. Oil has stimulated the citizenship in another direction. Midland is looking at itself with new eyes. Main street is going to be paved this winter. A white way will be installed and the cowmen are now talking about building a city hall and municipal auditorium. Midland has always been a good town, and just now is better than ever before.
