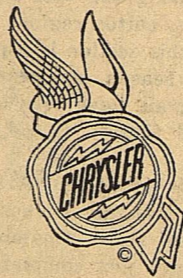

The week of October 3 to 9, 1926, has been designated by Governor Miriam A. Ferguson as Fire Prevention week in Texas.

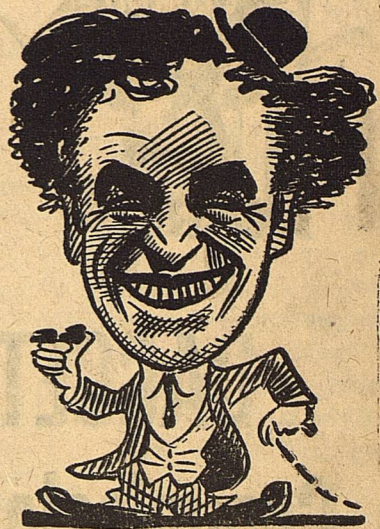
The annual loss in Texas has amounted to as high as \$20,000,000 and it is estimated that about 85 per cent of all fires are preventable.

Canadian—The cotton industry, which was started in this section last year, is rapidly and the crop promises to be among the best in comparison with older cotton regions. The wheat crop in this section is especially good also this season, and nearly 400 acres of this grain have been shipped from Hemphill County already.

Littlefield—President Arthur P. Duggan and Manager Homer D. Wade of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce have just completed a tour of the Hill Country District of the Chamber of Commerce territory. The first speech of the tour, made by president Duggan at Eastland opened the campaign in that section for the equalization of taxes in Texas. Duggan also spoke at the Convention of the Hills County District at Llano, and in San Antonio and other points. He and Manager Wade attended the Corpus Christi opening which was held September 14, 15.

Henrietta—For the second time within two months the Red River District Convention of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce has been called off on account of the heavy rains. The meeting was first called in July and after the first failure, the date was set for September 9. The band contest was held, despite the failure of the program as a whole. Decatur won in the contest.

Littlefield—Large crowds attended the Littlefield Labor and Trades Day celebration held in this city on Sept. 6. A program was given which proved of much interest to the visitors. Plans are being made for a dairy and horse show which will be the feature of the next trades day program. More than \$100 will be distributed in prizes on that day.

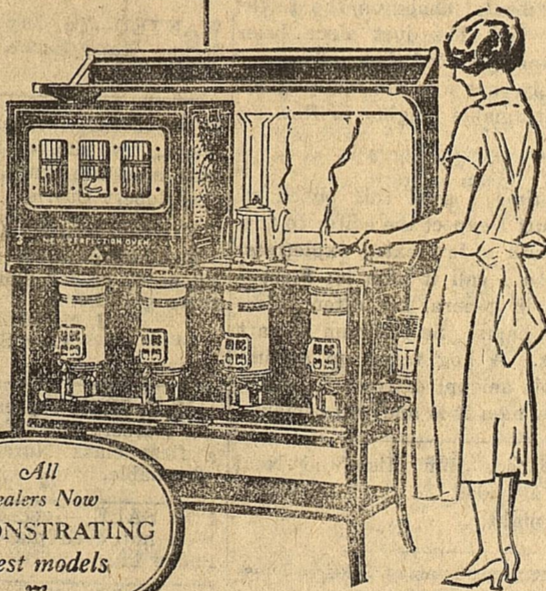

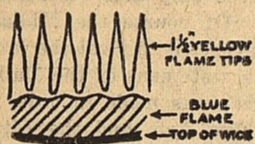

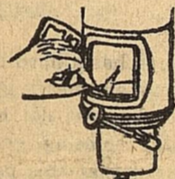

In the Kitchen with 6 Famous Cooks

BREADS AND BISCUITS AS 3 EXPERT COOKS MAKE THEM

(Ed. Note: This is one of a series of articles on cooking which 6 famous cooks are contributing to this paper.)

Bread can be much more than the uninteresting, prosaic "stuff of life." It can be made so delicious that you eat it because you want to, not because you think you ought to.

Famous cooks have unearthed many delicious bread and biscuit recipes from various parts of the country for you. Follow their recipes for pleasing variety in breads.

MRS. SARAH T. RORER

Easy Bran Muffins
Mrs. Rorer, the Philadelphia cooking expert, recommends her bran muffins for breakfast. "They are very nutritious and healthful," she says. "One might paraphrase the old saying into a bran muffin a day keeps the doctor away." It would hold just as true.
"These muffins are easily made," she affirms. "Beat one egg, add a cup of milk, a half teaspoon salt, one tablespoonful sugar, and one tablespoonful melted butter. Sift one cupful flour with three level teaspoons baking powder, and bake in a hot oven, in greased gem pans for 20 minutes."

Nuts for Nourishment

Mrs. Rorer has a very appetizing and nourishing nut bread, too. Here's how to make it:
Chop enough pecans to make a half cupful. Put two cupfuls flour in a bowl, add four level teaspoons of baking powder, half a teaspoon salt, and two tablespoonfuls of sugar, and sift. Mix in the nuts. Beat one egg, add one cupful of milk, mix and add the flour. Beat well, and turn at once into a greased bread pan.
Let stand 10 minutes. Light oven 2 minutes before bread is light. Bake half an hour at medium heat. Raisins may be substituted for nuts.
Nut bread makes very good sandwiches if spread with butter. Cream cheese may also be used for a simple, delicious filling.

Southern Corn Bread

Corn bread, that favorite of the South, is another nutritious change from the every-day white bread. Made with the recipe of Miss Rosa Michaelis, famous New Orleans cook, it's a welcome part of any meal. Here are the ingredients:
1/2 cup of sugar
4 cups cornmeal
1 1/2 teaspoons salt
3 eggs
2 tablespoonfuls baking powder
1/2 tablespoonful shortening
2 cups water (or milk, or the two mixed)
Sift corn meal, salt, sugar, and baking powder together. Add water or milk. Add yolks of eggs and shortening which has been heated. Add stiffly beaten whites of eggs. Put into a hot greased pan, and bake in hot oven. This can be served with butter or with syrup.

Real Beaten Biscuits

If you have a patient right arm, you are bound to make successful beaten biscuits. This is another old southern recipe of Miss Michaelis:
1 quart flour
1 1/2 teaspoons of lard
1 pint of milk
1 teaspoon salt
Sift dry ingredients. Then add the shortening and blend by using the fingers—rub until smooth; add gradually the liquid and knead all together till the dough is formed. Should be a rather stiff dough. Then lay the dough on a biscuit board and beat with rolling pin half an hour. Knead lightly and beat again for ten minutes, till air bubbles form all over the dough. Then roll out and cut with cutter in any shape and stick top here and there with fork. Bake in moderate oven about fifteen minutes or till top and bottom are a light brown.

Use Oranges

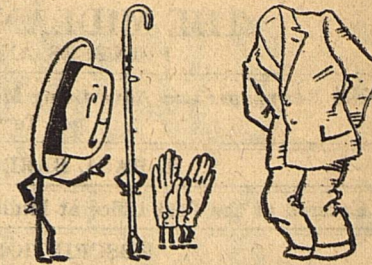
Orange muffins are just the thing for breakfast. Toasted, they are delicious to serve with afternoon tea. Mrs. Belle DeGraf, San Francisco, formerly with the Pacific Coast Branch of the New York Cooking School, gives this delectable recipe:
2 cups flour
4 teaspoons baking powder
1 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
1 egg
2 tablespoons melted butter
1 cup orange juice
Grated rind of one orange
Beat eggs and add liquid. Sift and combine dry ingredients. Add melted shortening and first mixture. Bake in greased muffin pans, in moderate oven about 20 minutes.
You may serve a different bread or biscuit every meal. These recipes are especially helpful to women with the lunch problem, as different sandwich fillings may be used with all but the beaten biscuit with good results.

Baking Hint

The oven should always be pre-heated a few minutes before biscuits are put in. They require fast baking.

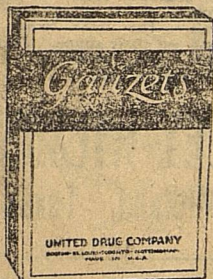

Of course the Midland club is not expected to rival the larger city but a statement of the Dallas clubs activities was made in order to show that Fine Arts and the Little Theater at one time is too large an order. The Little Theater is a Fine Art in itself.

The cities nearest Midland having Little Theaters now are Lubbock and Snyder.

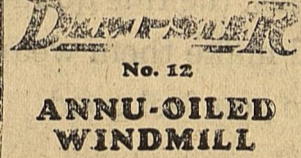
Legislature in Action

The public and the press are inclined to expect too much of legislators and are too free to criticize and belittle the body as a whole, but in most cases the legislature reflects the will of the people by whom it is selected.

Bond Validation

Long before the gathering of the legislature, it was known that the Texas road district bonds would be validated. The sentiment opposing such action is so small as to amount to little. Texans believe in paying their just debts and have little patience with those who would use technicalities to defeat the payment of either public or private debts. The man who would avoid an honestly made obligation is hardly considered a good citizen anywhere, and a state is but an aggregation of citizens. The only doubt that has ever been expressed by honorable citizens of Texas has been as to the best method of procedure to make sure that Texas fulfills its contracts made in good faith in its behalf.

Shoot the Hold-up Men

Captain Tom Hickman, of the Texas Rangers, is to be commended for the prompt way in which he and his assistants disposed of the bank robbers at Clarksville. They were shot down as they were leaving the bank with their loot. Burglars, robbers, and hold up men and women go at their work prepared to kill if necessary. At heart they are murderers as well as thieves. They are ready to kill those unprepared to defend themselves and do not give their victims a dogs chance to escape if murder is necessary to accomplish their ends. They richly deserve what Captain Hickman gave those fellows at Clarksville.

Plucky Blind Man

Dan Carroll lives in Parker County and is blind. He has a family to support. He was recently nominated for tax collector of Parker county, which in itself shows that his neighbors believe in him. There is a reason. Dan Carroll doesn't believe in sitting down and bemoaning his affliction. There will be no taxes to collect until Jan 1, so he has gone to the cotton patch to pick cotton. He can pick 250 pounds a day, locating the bolls by running his hands up and down the branches of the stalks. He picks the cotton pretty clean, but has a small boy to go with him to gather that which he may miss. Men of the Dan Carroll type are few and they can always find a way to take care of themselves.

Apple Shipping in Texas

Fort Davis has shipped its first car of apples for this season. They went to Abilene, and other cars are to be consigned to the same place. That looks good—Texas apples sold and consumed in Texas. Texas apples grown around Fort Davis, are said to be as good as any grown anywhere, and are of fine color and shipping qualities. The trees produce abundantly and the crop proves profitable. A recent photo graveur picture in the Houston Chronicle of a Ft. Davis apple orchard looks like it might be a section of the Garden of Eden. It may not be long before Texas apple orchards will be supplying Texas with all its apples.

Texas Advertising Campaign

W. V. Crawford, of Waco, a man with splendid accomplishments to his credit, has been made director of the movement to advertise the resources and possibilities of Texas to Texans and the outside world. A half million dollars or more is to be raised and spent to start the movement well on its way. I have one suggestion to Friend Crawford and others who would advance the interests of Texas and that is to quit referring to California and Florida and their accomplishments when mentioning the resources and possibilities of Texas. Why keep on advertising those states without making them foot the bills? Every comparative reference to them that contains even an imitation that they are in the same class with Texas is a bigger boost for those states than for Texas.
