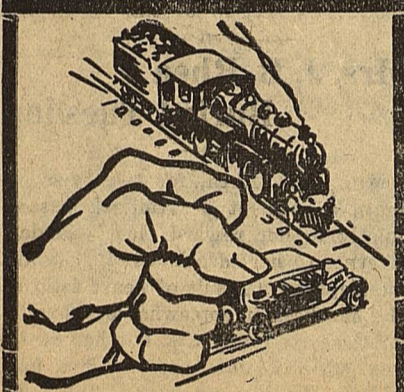

Stand Firmly Together

Kentucky's well known motto, "United We Stand, Divided We Fall" applies with especial force to the cotton situation in the South. There is not a man, woman or child in the entire cotton growing section who is not affected by the price of cotton, and unless prices are restored to a profit making basis before the bulk of the present crop passes out of the hands of the growers, thousands will be hopelessly bankrupt. You may be one who can sell at the ruinous prices now prevailing without suffering, but if so, you are an exception. Cotton at 12c today creates a worse condition than when cotton sold in 1914 at 6 cents, for a dollar now does not buy more than 50 cents bought then, and people are living more expensively than they lived then. They also owe more money that must be paid and for which they have looked to the cotton crop. Whatever plan is agreed upon for marketing this crop and planting another should be supported by every farmer and business man as well. By a united effort on the part of all, and only by such co-operation prices, can be restored. Don't do less than your whole duty to your countrymen in their time of need.

Intercollegiate Athletics

There is a general feeling that, although there may be some good resulting from school athletic teams playing with other school teams, the games are costing too much in both money and time, and diverting attention from the real purposes of the schools. The colleges say that so long as other colleges place such emphasis on athletics, they must do so to hold their students—that the schools with good teams get the publicity that draws patronage to them. If this is true, the schools are becoming athletic centers more than educational institutions and the training of the mind

is becoming secondary to athletic victories. There is no doubt that all the schools are now giving a more hearty welcome to athlete than to the student of less physical strength, whatever mental qualities he may show. The student is made to feel that physical strength is rated higher than mental equipment. Unfortunately the same feeling is extending to the high schools and is being fostered by the numerous contests between schools of neighboring towns and cities.

Scouting and Recruiting

There was a time when a student's grade in the preparatory school made college authorities anxious to have him continue his studies in their schools that he might reflect credit on the institutions as a student. Now, the colleges search, not so much for students of high rank, as for those who show prowess as athletes in the preparatory schools. "A" grades do not rank with goal kicks and home runs. The preparatory student sees this and centers his efforts on the things that will make him most popular when he gets to college.

There is complaint, too, that the recently inaugurated system of sending out scouts to see the kind of game played by an opposing team tends towards commercializing school athletics and encourages resort to questionable practices. The employment of high salaried professional coaches who must make a showing to justify their employment, partly accounts for any over-emphasis that may be placed in school athletics.

Burning Natural Gas

Center, over near the east Texas line, is rejoicing in the recent acquirement of natural gas, and practically every town from Texarkana to Port Arthur is soon to have this splendid fuel. The report comes too, that gas lines are to be put through the lower Rio Grande Valley down to Brownsville. In fact gas pipe lines are being laid almost all over Texas, and there appears to be sufficient natural gas to supply fuel for the entire State. There is nothing that adds more to the comfort of living than an abundant supply of natural gas at a reasonable cost, and Texas is fast becoming the ideal State in which to enjoy life.

Five Million Dollar Resort

The newspapers announce that Tex Rickard, the renowned "sports" promoter, has organized a company to build a \$5,000,000 resort at Nuevo Laredo, Mexico, across the river from Laredo Texas. Details as to the contemplated resort are not given, but it is generally supposed that emphasis will be placed on boxing, bull fighting, games of chance, drinking and other dissipation that are not in quite good standing in the United States. But that will attract so-called sporting life, from all over the world. It is altogether probable that when the new resort is in full swing the Texas Ranger Force along the Rio Grande about Laredo will find its duties increasing.

Legislative Investigations

The special session of the Legislature recently adjourned will be known for the numerous investigations it started and left unfinished. The session which will be held in January will begin handicapped by these numerous pending investigations, which will have to be disposed of in some way. It remains to be seen whether any of them will accomplish anything really worth while. Most investigating committees heretofore have done their work, made their reports, and been at once forgotten. They usually start enthusiastically and finish apathetically when they find that the Legislature refuses to consider their efforts seriously.

Grain Crop Seasons

The rains in North Texas are coming at a time to suggest the sowing of grain crops, and doubtless the North Texas acreage in wheat and oats will be increased largely. Indeed, indications now are that there may be as much overplanting of grain as there has been of cotton, but, fortunately, it is easier to hold grain than cotton for systematic marketing.

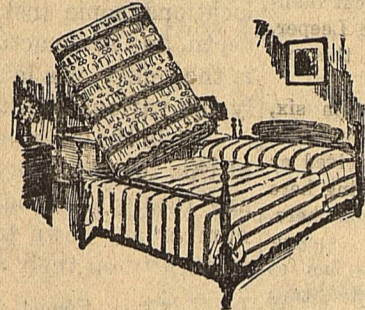

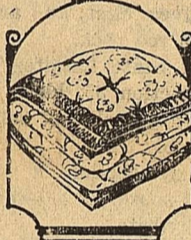

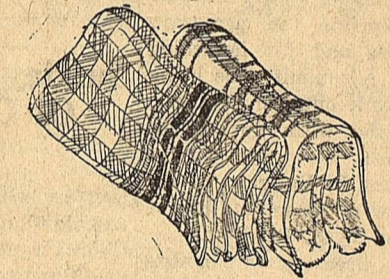

In the Kitchen with 6 Famous Cooks

NOVEL MEXICAN DISHES Pacific Coast Expert Tells How to Prepare Them

(Editor's Note: This is one of an unusual cooking series contributed to this paper by six famous cooks. Cut it out and paste in your cook book.)

Enchiladas, picadillo, Spanish rice, beans a la Ayre, and refritos!

Those words conjure up pictures of most palatable and spicy dishes to the Spaniard. And many an American has fallen for their tempting tooth-someness.

Mrs. Kate Brew Vaughn, home economics director, Los Angeles, and author of several cook books, was taught how to make these dishes by a Mexican lady.

Fragrant and Delicious

Mrs. Vaughn gives the following directions for making enchiladas. The gravy may be made the day before. Its ingredients are: 4 ounces chili peppers, 1 1/2 pounds tomatoes, 2 slices hard toast, 1 small onion, 1 pinch each of clove, thyme, pepper, sugar, and salt.

Open peppers, and if it is not desired very hot, remove veins and seeds. Soak in boiling water about 10 minutes. Skin tomatoes by holding over flame. Put toast and onion through food chopper and then strain all the ingredients in order to make a smooth gravy. Melt two tablespoons shortening in frying pan, add gravy, and simmer slowly until smooth and thick.

Filling for Enchiladas (Picadillo)

- 1 pound pork
 - 1 tablespoon shortening
 - 1 teaspoon chopped onion
 - Clove of garlic (chopped)
 - 1/2 cup chili sauce
 - 1 tablespoon chopped green olives
 - 1 tablespoon chopped, blanched almonds
 - 1 tablespoon raisins (chopped)
 - 1 teaspoon vinegar
 - 1 pinch salt
 - 1 pinch sugar
 - 1 teaspoon olive oil
- Boil pork until tender, then chop fine. Melt shortening and fry pork until brown. Add onion, garlic, and chili sauce, and fry for three minutes. Add olives, almonds, and raisins, and cook two or three minutes. Just before removing add vinegar, salt, sugar and olive oil.

Make Tortillas, Too

- 1 quart white flour
 - 1 cup lard
 - 2 teaspoons salt
- Enough water or milk to make dough sufficiently thick to roll out like biscuit.

Divide into balls size of turkey egg and pat between the hands until thin and round and cook on top of the stove without grease. After frying, dip in hot gravy, place on plate, and place 1/2 tablespoons of filling in center. Roll tortilla loosely and garnish with gravy, grated cheese, sliced onion that has been soaked in salt water a few minutes, a green olive, blanched almond, radish, and a sprig of parsley.

Spanish Rice

- 1 cup rice
 - 1 tablespoon shortening
 - 1 tablespoon chopped onion
 - 1 clove of garlic
 - 1/2 cup tomato sauce
 - 1 quart boiling water
 - Pepper and salt to taste
- Melt the shortening, add the onion, and partially cook, not allowing to brown. Add to rice and fry until brown. Add the tomato sauce a little at a time, allowing each portion to almost cook dry before adding more. Add the boiling water. Do not stir, and allow to simmer slowly until done. If it is necessary to add more water, be sure it is boiling. Do not stir. Requires about 1 1/2 hours of cooking, from the south, where chicken is one of the most popular dishes. She gives two southern ways of preparing it.

For southern broiled chicken, she says, select a very young chicken. Clean, singe, and split it down the back. It will almost lie flat. Season with salt and pepper, and brush melted butter all over it. Have a broiler ready over a moderate fire. Place chicken in it, and let it broil slowly for a half hour or a little longer if the chicken is not so tender.

Turn the chicken once in a while to brown both sides. When done, place on a heated platter which has been garnished with sprigs of parsley or lettuce leaves. Pour melted butter over chicken, and serve hot.

With Brown Sauce

Chicken prepared with brown sauce is good served with rice, Miss Michaelis says. Here are the ingredients:

- 1 chicken
 - 2 tablespoons lard
 - 1 sprig each of thyme, parsley, and bay leaf
 - 1 onion
 - 2 tablespoons flour, salt and pepper to taste
- Clean and cut chicken in small pieces. Season well with salt and pepper. Chop onion fine. Put lard into deep pot. When hot add onion and let brown. Add flour. Let this brown, and add chicken. Let simmer a few minutes with thyme, parsley, and bay leaf chopped fine. Stir often. When all is nicely brown, add 1/2 pints boiling water. Stir until it begins to boil.

If necessary, add more salt and pepper. Cover and let simmer until tender (about an hour). The gizzard, liver, and heart may be cooked with sauce, and served with boiled rice. No matter if the chicken is old or young, you can make it taste good if you choose one of these recipes.

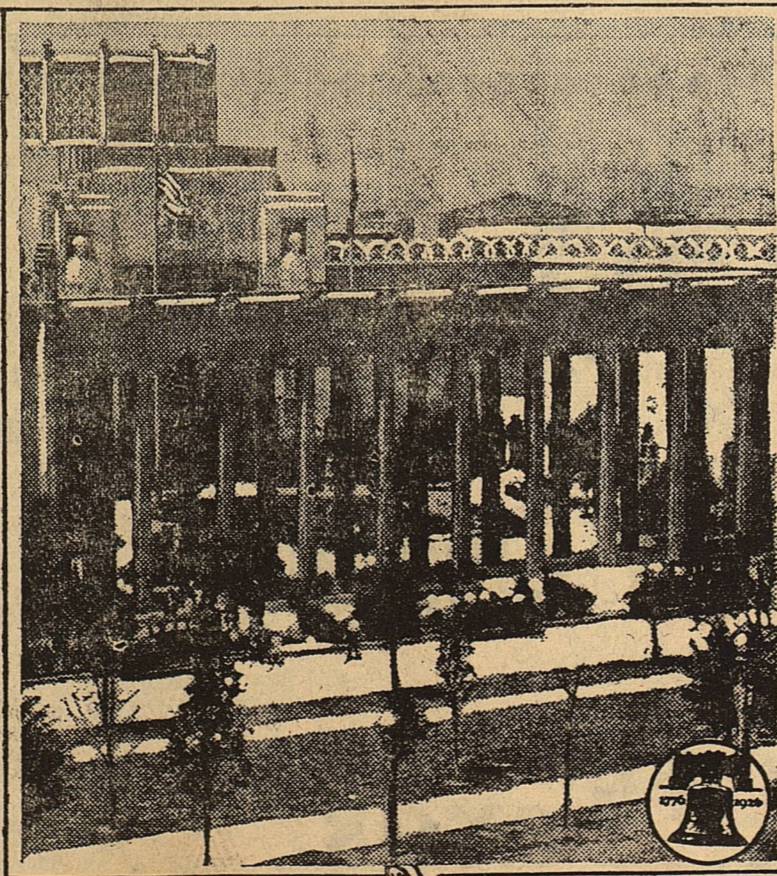

Vickers writes that they are getting in much good advertising and publicity for Midland, and that newspapers of Dallas have accorded him the privilege of getting much publicity in print.

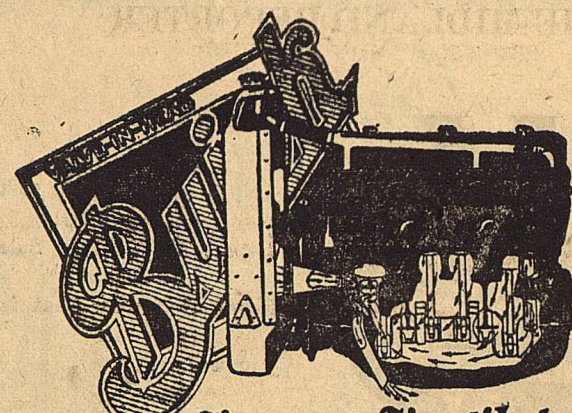
Will Rogers To Appear In Lubbock

Post—Garza County carried away first honors for West Texas and the South Plains this week in having its agricultural exhibit adjudged the finest agricultural display of all state entries at the Dallas Fair. The display was arranged by George (Scotty) Samson, Garza County Agricultural Agent, and featured small grains and grain sorghums. Garza's grain sorghums scored 193 points out of the possible 200, forage feeds 47 out of 50, and alfalfa 72 out of 75 points. The same exhibits took first honors at Lubbock and Abilene. The biggest demonstration in the history of Post was given on the return of George Samson from Dallas, over 1200 people with the band meeting him upon his arrival.

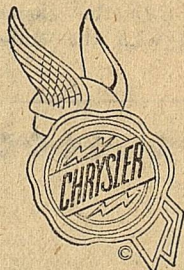

All voters who favor the proposition to issue the bonds for the construction and installation of street lights for said city shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"For the issuance of Street Lights Bonds in the Sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars."

All those opposed shall have written or printed upon their ballots the words:

"Against the issuance of Street Lights Bonds in the sum of Five Thousand (\$5,000.00) Dollars."

The manner of holding said election shall be governed by the Laws of the State of Texas regulating General Elections.

A copy of this order, signed by the Mayor of the City of Midland, Texas and attested by the City Secretary of said city, shall serve as proper notice of said election.




