



the Bend section of the Colorado river valley in Lampasas and San Saba counties have contracted to sell 750. 000 pounds of ordinary native pecans to pecan cracking establishments at San Antonio and Tyler for 12 1-4c a pound. This is really a low price for pecans this season, as the government reports only 71 per cent of a full crop as against 89 per cent in 1919, when Texas had its large pecan crop. The pecans sold were natives from wild trees, some of the fancy paper shell pecans from budded trees selling for 75c and \$1.00 a pound. It is easy to see that with the business well organized for systematic marketing, pecan growing in Texas will become a great industry. The business is not likely to be overdone. business is not likely to be overdone. The crop this year is estimated at 12,000,000 pounds in the United States or about one tenth of a pound for each person.

Texas Grain Sorghums Referring again to government reports, it is estimated that Texas will produce this year nearly 50,000,000 bushels of grain sorghums, which include milo maize, kaffir, corn, feterita, and the like. This is approximately 4 per cent of the sorghum crop grown in the United States. While the Texas crop is large, the prices are unsatisfactory. The farmers who have livestock to feed, and most good farmers have, are feeding the sorghum crops on the farms instead of marketing it, and it is going far toward relieving the financial distress due to the large cotton crop.
