

The pardoning power is badly abused, and almost any convict can secure petitions plea of sickness of himself or his

Too Much Sympathy

People of the best motives and pest intentions are showing too much sympathy with criminals and not enough with their unfortunate victims. A sentiment, maudlin in character, has been formed for the exercise of charity for the criminal on the ground that crime is a disease that should be treated and not punished. The suspended sentence and the parole originated in the best of purpose, but are being overworked to such an extent that the beneficiaries often become more hardened criminals because of the leniency shown. Jail prayer meetings, Christmas trees in prison, holiday and Sunday feasts are all well intended, but are at times so conducted as to leave criminals feeling that they are heroes who are being badly mistreated by the government. In our desire to obey the command to be merciful, we at times forget the part that just punishment has always played in making life, property, and government safe.

Lawyers See The Danger

In Texas, the best lawyers are reaizing that the courts, or rather court procedures, are playing a large part in encouraging crime. Many have known this for years, but they have never before been so thoroughly aroused to the necessity for better law nforcement. Too many lawyers have been sustaining themselves on fees obtained through crimes. Too many lawyers in the Legislatures have been dependent upon petty criminal practice for a living. This is all changing Legislators now have higher ethical standards. Lawyers are learning that to be known as the representatives of the worst criminals soon becomes unprofitable, because the better class clients will not employ them. # Can't Produce

The statement follows:

All fears of over production in pro- market." duce lines in Texas, as an overgrowth of diversification peachments are dispelled according to authoritative word that has come into headquarters office of the West Texas Chamber of Commerce. This word says that demand for produce, especially for poultry, eggs and cream far exceeds the supply, and that this condition is consistently true.

"As to definite proof of the statement, the rather small volume of Texas eggs that were stored in the Spring of 1926 have practically all been moved, and large quantities of Northern eggs are being shipped in.

"Cream production is a great deal less than half that which could be utilized by Texas creameries. A number of houses are being supplied from Oklahoma points because enough is not furnished stations through Texas production.

"Capacity of poultry plants of the State is being utilized only to about one-fifteenth of present scope. This is due solely to inability to procure chickens for the market.

"These three proofs of demand exceeding supply in the special fields of poultry, cream and eggs, come direct to the West Texas Chamber of Commerce office from S. A. Middaugh, writing from the managers office of Swift and Company, Stock Yards, Ft. Worth.





But the holly bough, of course, of all Christmas green is the loveliest and most popular, not only here but in other lands and in France, in particular, as Brittany grows it in quantities. The holly is of slow growth and propagated by seed which do not germinate until the second year. We think of holly berries always as being red, but some kinds bear yellow fruit, some white, and others even

The holly has a commercial value that isn't generally known. Its evengrained and hard wood is ivory white and is used for inlaying and as an ebony substitute for teapot handles and other articles, when stained. The leaves are used in medicine.-Frances Marshall Morgan.


