Reclaiming Bottom Lands Owners of overflow valley lands in Texas will be interested in the movement in Lamar and Delta counties to reclaim and put in cultivation about 10,000 acres of bottom lands of the North Sulphur river. These lands, as rich as any valley lands in Texas, have been subject to periodical overflows and have grown up in a vast wilderness of trees and undergrowth, making them practically worthless. The river is to be straightened and the land to be cleared and made ready for cultivation, a big undertaking, but well worth the cost of the work. There are hundreds of thousands of acres in Texas which could be converted from waste lands nto profitable farms by straightening the streams and by proper leveeing. Individual effort can accomplish little in this work, but district cooperation can work marvels.

New Rio Grande Project Almost every week some new irrigation project is started in Texas, filings being made on the streams in most cases by corporations and individuals who see possibilities that they have been going to waste by failure to use the stream waters. A permit has been granted to a party to irrigate 60,000 acres in Kinney and Maverick Counties, the work to begin within 90 days and to be completed in three years. It is best for district organizations to be formed and irrigation projects to be financed by the people themselves through bond issues, but the policy of the state is to grant these valuable rights to corporate and private interests where the people do not take the steps to utilize the stream waters. There are scores of localities in Texas that will at some early day find they have been indifferent to their own interests in letting the waters
