A caddy, Grafa says, gave the thing away. He was carrying the clubs for another clubman, and saw the proceeding from a teeing mat farther on over the hill. When the other members of the foursome saw they had been "duped,' Grafa says they came to him with the story saying that they were shifting alliance to the camp of Haight, that they were disillusioned with the candidate of their choice.

Seymour says he has a charge to prefer against Haight, also. Whether this is a repercussion or recrimination remains to be seen.

In the meantime, J. M. Caldwell, Sam K. Wasaff and Charles Yonge have been retained by Grafa to prosecute the case against Ellis. District Judge Charles L. Klapproth, City Judge Gilmore, and W. Edward Lee will defend Ellis, and prosecute the case to be given the press tomorrow.
