Date for voting on the two bond issues to be submitted property tax paying voters of the city of Midland has been set
by the City Council on February 6 , as will be seen in the detailed by the City Councli olsewhere in this issue of The Reporter One election is to decide on the issuance of refunding bonds in the amount of $\$ 68,999.64$ to take up warrants which have been year, including the paving of Texas avenue, construction of the
new water tank and tower, taking up six-inch water mains and replacing with eight-inch in the business section, and for other purposes outlined in the election order. These warrants are draw ing 6 per cent, whereas the bonds to be voted on would draw only
$51-2$ per cent.
The other issue is for bonds of $\$ 130,000$ to cover the proposed system, including the building of a pipe line from Cloverdale, the half section of land four miles southeast of town on which the citys big wells, are located.
The election will be held at the county court house, with J. M.
