Application for the charter has been sent in by Rufus Wright of Sweetwater, who was appointed as the personal representative of District Governor Ellis H. Boyd of Fort Worth to organize the club in Midland.

W. I. Pratt, formerly president of the Rotary club at Stamford, was unanimously elected to head the Midland organization. Mr. Pratt has had several years experience with Rotary, and is thoroughly imbued with its principles and ideals, and predicts that Midland will profit greatly from having such a club.

Core Drilling on No. 6 Upton Begins

Washington, Jan. 25 .- Core drilling, under supervision of the Bureau of Mines, is to begin immediately on potash well No. 6 in Upton county. Churn-drill operations have been completed and the core drill will be sunk to a depth of about 1,500 feet.

This test well is on the Burleson Sun lease some three miles north of McCamey, where oil drilling has demonstrated that potash salts are encountered at a depth of about 500 feet. Following completion of this test the drill will be moved to Hughes-Roxana lease, section 4, William Teer survey, Upton county, about 10 miles north of McCamey.

Here potash salts have been encountered at a depth of 450 feet and the test will be drilled to 1,200 or 1,500 feet. Both operations will be conducted by the Pennsylvania Drilling Company of Pittsburgh, the low bidders.

The Bureau of Mines estimated that sufficient money remains in the exploration fund for this year to permit drilling one additional well.






