Farm Board Would Be Created by Executive

WASHINGTON, April 16. -(A)-President Hoover, in a message of unusual brevity and directness, recommended to congress today the creation of a federal farm board with authority and resources to remedy recurring causes

ADDRESS President Hoover's message to congress today contained three major problems with which the federal government must cope:

1. Improvement of waterways. 2. Tariff readjustment. 3. Adjustment of production

American towns along the Mexican border have been experiencing a rush of tourist business lately. Motorists from far and near are driving down in the hope of seeing a battle between the Mexican rebel and federal troops. A recent dispatch says:

"American motorists who arrived at Naco, Arizona, in large numbers in hope of seeing the battle of yesterday continued around the Mexican part of the town were asappointed. It is reported another attack is being planmed by the rebels."

These motorists deserve a good deal of sympathy. It must be tough to take a long drive under a broiling sun to see a little wholesale slaughter, only to find out, when Du get there, that hostilities have been suspended. One leopes that these drivers were able to take in a nice hanging or two on the way home, so that their day wasn't entirely wasted.

It has been a long time since anything more fundamentally indecent than this flocking to the sidelines of battle has been reported. To be sure, we all do it by proxy, when we read the accounts of the battles in the newspapers, yet there is quite a difference between reading







Along about half past one, in some eight American cities, a quarter of a million fans will experience that first flash of a new white ball from the pitcher's hand.

The 1929 major league season will be under way. BANANA PUDDING

Three bananas, 1 cup sugar, eggs, 1 cup stale cake crumbs 114 cups milk, 3 tablespoons lemon juice, 2 teaspoons grated lemond rind, 4 teaspoon salt, tablespoons powdered sugar.

Peel, scrape and slice bananas Sprinkle with lemon juice. Bea 2 whole eggs and yolks of 2 eggs with sugar, salt and lemon rind and milk. Add cake crumbs and bananas. Mix lightly and turn into a buttered baking dish. Bake 30 minutes in a moderate oven. Cover with meringue and bake ten minutes longer in a slow

To make meringue, beat the whites of two eggs until stiff and dry. Fold in powdered sugar and pile on top of pudding.
