

A GROWING NUISANCE

"One of the most serious menaces to attractiveness in West Texas towns, and Midland is not free from it, is the growing nuisance of old wrecked automobiles and other machinery dumped along the highways and on lots which must be seen by the citizens and the people passing through.

Chief of Police King Reid says that in his opinion, ridding Midland of these unsightly old cars is one of the most important features of the clean up campaign.

Homer D. Wade, manager of the West Texas chamber of commerce, in a letter of denunciation of the practice of dumping old machinery in that manner said: "Our West Texas towns are laying claim to civic attractiveness, and yet in many instances their magnificent appearance is eriously marred by an acre of broken up and rusty automobiles and other machinery dumped on the roadside just outside of the city limits.

"This practice of parking this unsightly junk on or near public highways, detracts in every possible manner. It should have the frown and opposition of every man, woman and child in West Texas that appreciates the beauliful and that abhors the unseemly.

WELLS MUST DIE IS VERDICT OF **COLEMAN COURT**

COLEMAN, April 19.-District Judge E. J. Miller, carrying out the mandate of the court of criminal appeals, today sum-moned O. C. Wells to the courtroom and formally sentenced him to die in the electric chair at Huntsville penitentiary, Friday, May 31.


Asked if he knew any reason. why sentence should not be pronounced, Wells began pleading his case, asserting that he had not been properly represented at his trial and that he was convicted under an old law that had been repealed by the legislature of 1927. Failing to stay the sentence,

he asked that his body be sent to Houston for burial following the electrocution. Wells was brought here last night from Huntsville to face the court.

he court. J. N. Wells, brother of the condemned man, was the only relative in the courtroom when sentence was pronounced. The prisoner will be returned to prison at once. The crime for which he was

convicted was committed here the night of February 27, 1927, when J. A. Mitchell was shot and killed at his filling station and grocery store. He was tried in the district court of Coleman county and sentenced to die
