#### **GAS PIPE LINE** HELD INVALID BY TEX. COURT

AUSTIN, une 9—A three-judge United States district court Wednesday held invalid a Texas law requiring pipe line carriers of gas to purchase equally the production of operators who did not have their own outlets.

own outlets.

The law, known as the common purchaser act, passed by the last session of the legislature, sought to force owners of pipe lines who built to their own wells to take the output of others in the field ratably or without discrimination in favor of the production of the pipe line owners.

Owners.

Under the law the owners of the pipe line could not take more gas from their own wells than they took from those without connections and

from those without connections and it required them to purchase the gas of others ratably.

The court held that the legislature was without power to impose authority with the Texas railroad commission to regulate pipe lines, holding that for the commission to have authority to impose penaltiets on pipe lines not complying with its rules amounts to taking property without due process of law.

without due process of law.

Although the law provided for ratable taking of both oil and gas by pipe lines, today's decision affected only provisions applying to slaying of Jesus Villareal.

Plaintiffs in the case, which was tried before the three judges at Houston, were the Texoma Natural Gas company, the Citics Service Gas company, the North American Oil and Gas company, and the Panhandle Eastern Pipe line company. The court held that these were "private pipe line carriers, who have not devoted their property to the public use for hire or compensation." And that "penalties imposed for violating terms of the act are so extreme as to make the

the court pointed out that it was the purpose of the act "to compel pipe line producers to share their markets with producers in the same field who are without markets by requiring them to purchase," gas those producers without pipe line

The equitable principle of cor "The equitable principle of correlative rights or ratable takings of gas from a common pool is sought to be applied through compulsory purchase," the court held. "The act requires a private carrier engaged in interstate commerce to assume the responsibilities of a common carrier and those of a common nurchaser. This invades the

mon purchaser. This invades the field of federal cognizance, interferes with and burdens the commerce between the states contrary to article one, section eight of the federal constitution?

to article one, section eight of the federal constitution."

Decision of the court was on plaintiff's application for interlocutory injunction and it will be necessary for the court to assemble again to pass on plaintiff's application for a permanent injunction and for a hearing on its merits.

The opinion held that plaintiffs, to avoid forfeiture of their gas leases are required to drill and develop the same; that if they are compelled to comply with the provisions of this act the obligators of the contracts evidenced by these leases will be unconstitutionally im-

The court pointed out that since "the subject matter at issue is gas," the holding would not affect the law's provisions with reference to regulation of pipe lines taking oil.

Maurice Cheek, assistant attorney general, said that he believed the status with reference to pipe lines handling oil would be different, since they were engaged in intrastate commerce, while the gas pipe lines were in interstate commerce.





#### STRANGE ASPECT OF THE TAX BILL

The new tax bill is going to make things tough for gangsters. It gives the government the right to slap a 100 per cent tax on any profits that come from illegal activity, and hereafter the bootlegger or racketeer who marches in to pay his income tax is going to get an unpleasant sur-

All of this, probably, comes under the heading of good news. We haven't had such distinguished success in our war on gangsters that we can afford to overlook any new law that will enable us to clamp down on them a little more effectively. And yet, when you stop to think about it, the whole

business is a little bit funny. It constitutes, probably, the most roundabout way yet

devised for sneaking up on criminals. Here, in effect, is what we tell the gangster:

'Go ahead and put on your rackets if you like. Bootlegging, gambling, murder—try anything you please, for the chances are about 50 to 1 that we shan't be able to catch you, or to punish you if we do catch you.

"But watch out for the money you make. If you come in to pay a tax on it, as the law provides, we'll take it all away from you. And if you don't come in at all, and we find out about it, we're apt to send you to prison for a

To be sure, this roundabout method finally landed no less a man than Al Capone in the jug; and half a loaf, in an affair of this kind, can be a whole lot better than no bread at all. But it's a funny system, and if our famous American sense of humor were working properly we'd be laughing at ourselves night and day.

What it means is that the income tax law is about

the only one we can hope to enforce.

Which, in turn, may mean that we are a lot more in earnest about punishing crimes against money than we are about punishing crimes against life or public decency.

#### VON PAPEN: 1918 AND 1932

Nothing shows more clearly how the passions of wartime have died down than the way in which the American public has received the news that Colonel Franz Von Papen has been called to the helm of the German republic.

In 1917 and 1918 this Von Papen was one of the nation's favorite hates. As military attache at the German embassy in Washington, prior to America's entrance into the war, he had been a little bit more active for the Fatherland than a diplomat in a neutral land is supposed to be, and President Wilson demanded, and got, his recall. And for a long time after that no good American could speak of him without denouncing him.

But things have changed, somehow. Called to help save Germany from Hitlerism, he enjoys the good will of all Americans. Which indicates, perhaps, that war-time hatreds are artificial things which die rapidly as soon as their artificial stimulus is removed.

#### MINIMIZING THE CHANCES

It is permissible to wonder just how far an international conference on world economic conditions is likely to get if all discussion of reparations and war debts is omit ted, as this government has stipulated. To be sure, there are several hundred answers to the


great question, "What is wrong with the world?" And nobody seems quite wise enough to tell us just which one of them may be most nearly correct. Yet it seems fairly obvious that the reparations-war debts tangle is inextricably tied up with the general economic collapse.

Can the job of setting world business right be tackled properly if it be assumed from the start that reparations and war debts are strictly secondary matters? Maybe so; but it does seem as if such an attitude distinctly minimizes the chances for success.

# Jefferson Supreme As Party Boss; Hamilton, Burr Fought for Power



EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the second of a series of six daily stories on the important part political bosses have played in the choice of the nation's presidents from the early days of the republic down to the present.

NEA Service Writer (Copyright 1932, NEA Service) WASHINGTON.—The first imwashington.—The first important political bosses in this republic, who gave us a system that still endures in 1932, were Thomas Jefferson and Alexander Hamilton. 

There had been seven admirals in the Rodgers family. It was a tradition to be a fighting man in the U. S. Navy. John Rodgers IV was a fighting man and he figured in the most dramatic episode in the annals of aviation.

The plane he commanded, the P-N-9, No. 1, went down in the ocean, 25 hours out from San Francisco on the way to Hawaii. Instruments were not so accurate then, it had strayed from its course and was out of fuel. Capt. Rodgers and his crew of four men faced almost certain death.

The seaplane stayed afloat, tossed by rolling seas. "We won't give up," said Rodgers firmly. "Right," said his four comparions.
