The new law, to become effective immediately, provides for the creation of a federal agricultural board of nine members, to work for the rehabilitation of American agriculture, through a series of stabilization corporation and commodity councils.

Pollard Says Legal

"Opinion" Was Questioned

BULLETIN AUSTIN, June 15 .- House representatives as a committee of the whole will probably vote on impeachment charges early next week against J. T. Robison, commissioner general of the land office, it was indicated tonight.

The proponent's lawyers are said to have one more witness and plan no rebuttal. Witnesses Moody and Pollard today testified in the case

-Attorney General Claude Pollard was quizzed at length today before the House, regarding his investigation of charges against J. T. Robison, state land commissioner. Robison's disagreement

over branches of the state government were under consideration. After being questioned by House attorneys supporting the charges against Robison, Pollard was subjected to grilling cross examina-tion by Lloyd Price, of Fort Worth attorney for Gibson and Price of Abilene, who bid \$875,000 on University land leases which Moody and University regents and Pollard tried to have withdrawn from the mar-

ket last fall. Pollard testified that Robison agreed to withdraw the land if furnished a "well considered opinbeing conducted in the First Baptist ion" that he could do so legally.



DEVELOPMENT OF PARK IN WEST END PLANNED BY NEIGHBORS

First Development To Be Started Immediately

An important step in the designation and development of civic parks in Midland is being made in the purchase by neighbors in the west part of Midland of a triangular strip of ground, namely block 33. This strip is to be improved as a neighborhood park.

Headed by F. W. Estill, home owners and property owners have bought this property, which is bounded by H. Street and Indiana and Holloway Avenues; and will plant trees, shrubs, grass and other greenery, laying the park out with concrete curbs and walks.

The development of the tract is now being held up pending setting of grades for curbs. On account of play in the chamber of commerce the fact that cross section surveys of the city, setting exact locations for payement, sewers, sidewalks, etc. have not been made, these lines must be started; according to one of the. leaders in the park movement.


First Improved Park Development of this park site by individuals will be the first actual community park work done in the city, although other sites have been designated and partially developed. Extensive park improvement is con-



Cotton planting is practically completed ond most fields have been chopped. A good stand is reported in most cases and plants are doing well. A record wheat crop is being rapidly harvested. Fruits and vegetables are moving out in very large volume; quality is excellent this year, but prices are declining seasonally. Right now an upward trend in farm prices would be a most desirable development, but it appears to be carried further before an adjustment is forthcoming.



From 10 to 14 tons is the limit states have affixed as the largest burden that a loaded truck may lawfully impose upon state highways. Usually the greatest load that may be carried on one rear wheel

Trucks loaded to the limit have little effect on the road surface while standing. But the moment the static, on standing load, becomes a "live" load as the vehicle wheel may be several times the weight carried by the wheel. For example, one wheel of a truck loaded to the legal limit may strike the road surface a blow of 10 tons or

With commercial traffic increasing rapidly, and admittedly to the public benefit, the modern road must be designed not only with passenger cars but with the heaviest bus and truck traffic in mind. Inferior roads, roads of no real structural strength, cannot be expected o carry present day traffic without breaking down.

Pavements may now be built with every expectancy that they will cartraffic 25 or more years—and smoothly. These pavements will carry the legal load countless times daily, year in and year out, with no fear of costly deterioration.

Recently in Chicago repairs on a through artery compelled the detouring of traffic on side streets, streets that were giving good, though not excellent, service. Within one month the pavements on these side streets were utterly ruined by the heavy traffic pounding over them.

This is but an instance where economy in road building may not be economy at all, but rather parsimonious buying.

There is no place in the transportation scheme, where traffic is fairly heavy, for pavements that will not stand up under the demands imposed upon them by heavy vehicles, which nowadays are to be found in growing numbers wherever there are half-way "decent" roads and streets, the men say.





America's "Next War" Will Be Won or Lost by Navy's Battles In Air, Says Flying Secretary

air force of the United States navy is now the countrys' first line of defense. If war comes, the naval air forces will be the first unit to get into action—and on its success or failure will depend, in large measure, the ultimate outcome of hos-

And no longer is the seacoast the main object of defense-huge airplane carries hovering 250 miles off shore, could discharge fleets of airplanes that could cross to the coast and bomb cities far inland.

This is the assertion of Ernest Lee Jahncke, the flying first assistant secretary of the navy, who is making a national tour of inspection, accompanied by two naval pilots, in a big Ford tri-motored plane. He flew from Washington to New Orleans in 11 hours.

Since he entered the cabinet last March, Jahncke has been making an especial study of the navy's air problems and air needs. In an exclusive interview here he told what the navy's air force does, what it needs and what it costs.


Plane Revolutionizes Warfare The invention of the airplane, he asserts, has caused as great a revolution in naval tactics and strategy as the famous Merrimac and Monitor did in the Civil War.

"Always we have been told that the navy was America's first line of defense," he said, "Now it is the navy air force. A navy limited to the surface of the sea might as well be scrapped. You can't conceive a havy without airplanes any more than you can conceive a navy without battleships.

"Under the conditions that will mark the next war, if it ever comes,



Three Cases of Murder or Suicide Form Baffling Chain of Mysteries

PROTESTS BRING NEW PROBES IN ROBERTS, LINN, HUNTINGTON DEATHS

NEW YORK, June 15.—Suicide-

or murder? In a welter of conflicting evidence, puzzling testimony and seemingly irreconcilable facts, three of the most baffling recent mysteries involving the shooting of four persons—remain unsolved.

Within a few weeks three young men and one young woman, all members of prominent and well-todo families, have been killed, and elements of striking similarity run through each case. Under storms of public criticism, further probes have tended to disprove the original theories of suicide

First came the death of Walter Huntingdon, of Windsor, Conn., son of a wealthy family and a student at Harvard University. During a week end visit to his home, his body was found, neatly laid out in a field a few miles away. Authorities first

Huntington was right handed. He had been shot behind the left car. 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
