



FT. WORTH, June 17 .-(UP)-Fire which followed a blast on the board walk swept the Lake Worth Casino Park today, leaving the million dollar play ground in ruins. The actual damage was later computed at half a million dollars.

The blaze was discovered at 3:20, and fanned by a high wind, it quickly became out of control. The cause of the explosion is unknown, the place being practically deserted at the time.

were destroyed.

"Big Boy," the 300-pound gorilla, was burned to death, his weird and almost human screams sounding above the fire as the flames licked into his cage.


#### GOOD NEWS FOR ANGLERS
