Exoneration Comes From Statements of Robbers

WICHITA FALLS, August 15.—(P)—Men giving their names as Paul Brooks, 28, and G. T. James, 19, were arrested on an inbound passenger train today by local officials, in connection with the Wil-

More than \$3,100 has been recovered. The loot was between \$3,000 and \$4,000.

BIG SPRING, Aug. 15.—Announcement of plans to make Big Spring one of the best-equipped division terminals in the State was made here Wednesday, after a equipment of the 8th Attack Squad- layed by headwinds. meeting Tuesday night of Big ron. Spring citizens and J. A. Somerville, vice president of the Texas and Pacific Railway Company.

Work of grading the T. & P. Reservation here will start within 10 days. Somerville said. The specifications call for 150,000 cubic yards of grading, declared to be one of the largest dirt jobs ever projected

As soon as grading is completed, the official added, the railway company will be ready to go ahead on plans for buildings and other improvements. Thirteen large buildings and several small structures are included in the terminal plan. A rearrangement of tracks also will be necessary.






