





Whiteker's plan calls for the raising of 90 units of \$200 each, totaling \$18,000, or lesser amounts if necessary, pledges to be taken from the membership of the West Texas chamber's vice-presidents, directorate, banks and other large institutions in the territoy, and wealthy individuals not on the board but having the WTCC's interest at heart. The fund is to be appli only on the debt incurred prior to last June 5, date of Wade's resignation, with all checks or cash received to be held on deposit and not cashed until \$12,000 is in hand. If that sum is not secured, all contributions are to be returned.


But the goal will be reached Whiteker confidently predicts. Starting his campaign in Abilene only itn days ago, he already has raised nearly \$5,000, with Abilene thus far pledging the largest amount.
