MIDLAND AND COLEMAN START CHAMPIONSHIP SERIES TODAY

STEBBINS, COLEMAN FIRST BASEMAN, WITH PANTHERS REJOINS CLUB TO GIVE BOBCATS ADDITIONAL WALLOP

Lee Stebbins, Coleman first baseman who has been adding punch to the Fort Worth Panther infield for the past week, is back at his old post this afternoon as Midland and Coleman battle through the first game of the play off series in Coleman.

Tom Carson and Grady White have been selected as umpires for all games of the seven-game play-off. It has been announced by Dave Snodgrass, loop prexy.

Favored in the street corner fanning bees as starting pitchers are Harris, southpaw, for Coleman, and Blake for Midland. Earlier in the week, however, Manager Jack Holloway of the Bobcats had announced tentatively that the responsibility of the first game would be placed on Hinson, a right hander. There have been no announcements from the Midland camp, but Holloway was anticipating "Peewee" Gene Moore as the Colt twirler when he stated that Hinson would help usher in the series.

In the eyes of West Texas, Midland has a better chance to win the West Texas playoff than Coleman. Substantial figures support this acceptance.

An Associated Press story, dated last night in Coleman, gives Coleman an almost even break, however, in the series starting today. The story, which cites the defensive strength of Coleman fielders and a better balanced pitching staff among the Jack Holloway men, is reprinted below:

Boasting two regulars hitting over the 400 mark and five others clouting the ball better than 300, the Midland Colts, winners of the second half of the West Texas league race, have been established slight favorites over the Coleman Bobcats, first half champs, in their seven-game play-off.

While only three of their number are hitting over 300, the Bobcats partly balance the scales with a better defensive machine, both infield and outfield, and a better balanced pitching staff. Earned run averages show the Bobcat hurlers the more effective.

Little Gene Moore, a southpaw, and Blake probably will catch the burden of mound duty for the Colts. They are the only dependable twirlers on Manager John King's club. The Bobcats, on the other hand, have Kowalik, the league leader in percentage of victories. Hinson, Halbert, Myers and Harris, of nearly equal calibre.

NEW YORK, August 29.—(P)—Three persons were killed and 11 injured today in a fire in a 4-story tenement house. Charles Hollander, 65, was killed when he jumped to the ground. The bodies of Mrs. Sophie Brunswasser and her 17-year old son were found in a third floor apartment, their deaths having been caused by smoke and burns.

The series was due to be stopped in Coleman today, according to early reports of tourists who said that rain had started falling in that direction early today.

Midland fans want rain; but they want to see the playoff as early as possible. This does not mean, however, that Midland would like to see the rain wait on the series. Essentially Midland county is a stock raising and farming district, and rains are remembered from back beyond the days of baseball in Texas.

Stebbins, returning to Coleman, gives Coleman a better break. Hitherto, the club had reason to feel blue through loss of Cam Best, who was lost to the team through temperament. That was on the eve of the playoff, too. The young outfielder was shown the gate with tourist map precision by three Coleman players and two umpires. Angelo and Coleman were playing and Cam swat a triple. When he stepped over first base without touching the bag he was called out, and then shown out as his demonstration of wrath became obnoxious.

Carl Williams, associated with the Wichita Falls and Abilene clubs, feels in his bones that Midland is jumpy. He is probably correct. What club would not be jumpy after winning such a per cent of games since the first of June—since it would require winning that per cent to keep ahead of the charging Bears from Ballinger Land? Williams says that Coleman might beat Midland if its team got away to a lead. That also is possible, but Williams' words that compose the conditions are testament to Midland's prowess:

"If Coleman can get the jump on the Midland warriors, Coleman may win." Prexy Anderson, versatile Abilene writer says: "If Coleman can get first blood in the series, they are likely to march through to the title, the slugging prowess of the opposition notwithstanding. The idea is that Midland's club as a whole is possessed of championship power, but lacks the championship heart."

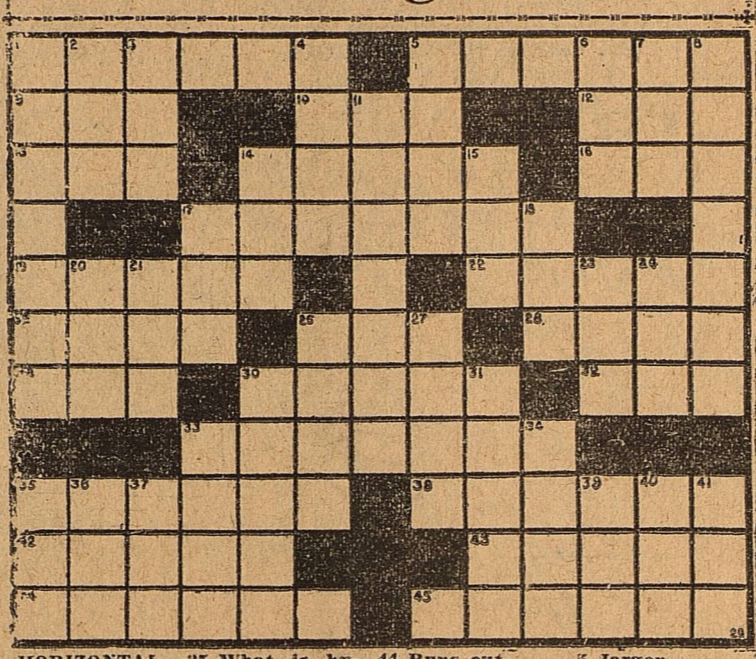
We believe in Midland that Prexy is a good writer and does a thing well—generally. We like to read his stuff. But every man has a few tacks to winward, and we think the above assertion is three points shy. A team that can win 23 out of 28 in a row—when pressed by the most hustling ball club in the league—ought to have a different classification, we would be inclined to think.

Midland should beat Coleman. The words of the sentence are more than contingent. Midland has the best ball club in the circuit—not a chance of a doubt. Midland is not a paper club; it simply gets out there and wallops the seams out of the horsehide. And Midland is a money club, and popular as such. Its little case of nerves has not hurt its play seriously. It will probably come back at Coleman and lace up the championship in a tidy fashion.

Stanley Norman, who writes oil news, local events, spot stuff and routine for the Herald in Big Spring, has a word to say about the disposition of Big Spring's luminaries:
