# \*City Council to Pass on 11 Paving Bids This Afternoon

Midland Cattle Successively Top St. Louis Market

Engineers Busy With Tabulating Bids After Noon

Eleven contractors or officials of contracting companies are in Midland today awaiting action of the city council on paving bids placed this morning.

City engineers were at work and tabulating the bids. The fine as anyone could ask. council was to meet at 3 o'clock for acceptance or re- GIST DELEGATION jection of bids.

Engineers call for two types of paving and curbs and gutters, for heavy duty type needed for business streets and for the lighter type used in the residential section of the city.

Division one, calling for the heavy type construction, specifies 30,780 square yards of pavement, division two 29,050 square yards.

In the residence street type pavgutters and 1,270 lineal feet of 24inch gutters, and 520 lineal feet of concrete curbing.
