

The Texas crop is practically made, and prospects for a top crop are poor.

The trouble started at one o'clock this morning, when eighty members of the United Textile Workers of America, which recently settled a strike at the mill, walked out, and formed a picket line outside the mill gate. When shifts changed at six o'clock someone fired a shot and soon there was a general fusillade.



SELLING MIDLAND COUNTY AT HOME

A well known Midland business man had been on a trip which kept him away from the city several weeks. He returned, a month or more ago, to find dry weather and heard much talk about the poor conditions of crops and the probability of slow business conditions.

The business man felt blue. Without going over the county to look at crops, he heard the talk about bad conditions until he began to believe it.

He heard of the new school house which has been completed recently at Cotton Flat, and decided to go out and see it. He came back commending the new school house, but that wasn't what impressed him most.

Cotton was "popping open" before his very eyes, and the crops looked better to him than in any part of the state. He talked to farmers and found that many of them will make from one-fourth to one-third of a bale per acre on land which didn't have a drop of rain on it for 90 days. And they had good feed crops too.

"Show me a farming country that will beat that!" was his exclamation when he talked to the Reporter-Telegram editor. "What we need is to sell ourselves on Midland County and its value as a farming country. If Midland business men would inform themselves on what can be done by good farmers in the county, and if every organization would bend its efforts toward bringing additional substantial farmers and their families here, prosperity would not only be permanent but it would be greater than it has ever been before."

Nine Years On House And Still Unfinished

DENISON, Tex., Oct. 2.-(AP)-In Denison it isn't "the house that Jack built," but the house that L. D. Gaffey built—or is building as it will be for two years more when the one workman plans to have completed his full-size business structure with his own hands after 11 years of atient toiling at odd hours.

In 1920, Mr. Gaffey single-handed started the task of erecting a concrete structure 50 by 120 feet, and now, after nine years of labor, expects to finish the first floor for ccupancy within a few months and to fully complete the building within two years.

Working with "mental blueprints' and plans alone, Mr. Gaffey is a stone mason, cement man, carpener, plumber, electrician and all other building craftsmen within him self. His hands are equally skilled with saw or trowel.

The undertaking of assembling materials into the two story structure alone would conquer the average man. But Mr. Gaffey has mouldd with his own hands more than 000 cement squares used in the walls of the building.






