Fire classes, physical and moral, or personal, as they are sometimes called. The physical hazards are inherent in the risk itself and in its surroundings, and may be partially measured or estimated, and to a certain extent controlled. Moral hazards arise from personal factors, and are hidden, presumed rather than known, not to be measured or



Citizens of the entire nation will observe Fire Preention Week beginning today, and continuing through October 12. Activities on the part of Midland people expended toward the prevention of fire, which at the same time automatically tend to save life and avoid personal in-

jury, are a necessity and obligatory civic duty.

It is important that Midland people take due notice of Fire Prevention Week, look to the fire hazards on their own premises, and eliminate any possibility of loss of life or property from this cause.

During 1928, the loss of life from fire in the United cording to E. L. Nelson, division pas-States is estimated at 10,000 persons. The number in Texas was 349, an increase of 110 over 1927. Property losses amounted to \$472,224,568 in 1928, the Texas losses amounting to approximately \$20,000,000. Midland has a comparatively good fire record, but it is the duty of all Becherer. citizens to keep it so.

FIRE PREVENTION WEEK

Statisticians have placed the loss of life by fire in the United States last year at 10,000, while we are told that twice that number of persons were seriously burned, most of these casualties being women and

We learn also from carefully compiled estimates that while an appreciable decline is being shown in the fire loss record of the country, the destruction of property in 1928 was about \$472,000,000.

Texas contributes a full share of these deaths and injuries along with some \$20,000,000 of the wastage of property values.

A fire loss is a loss no matter how it is figured. The partial relief that insurance affords adds but another item to our tax burden, but that which fire consumes is gone forever.


A large majority of the fires that occur are preventable, for they spring from conditions that exist principally because of our indifference toward them. Fire Prevention Week is set aside each year as a time for us to think and act on preventing, restricting and extinguishing fires.

Now, therefore, I, Leon Goodman, mayor of the city of Midland, Texas, do hereby proclaim the period of October 6th to 12th as Fire Prevention Week in this city this year.

Let our public officers, school authorities, local organizations, and all of our people, prepare for execution during that time an educational program which shall include instruction of school children in ways and means of preventing fires, as well as a campaign against fire hazards and all conditions that may cause or promote the spread of fire; and when we shall have thus finished our observance of the occasion, let us utilize the lessons and experiences so gained in making fire prevention an important and permanent phase of the civic life of this community.







Gov. Dan Moody's candidacy against Senator Sheppard, should it materialize, would prove an interesting contest. Senator Sheppard not only voted for Gov. Alfred E. Smith of New York for president but he stumped the country for him, and Senator Sheppard is the author of the 18th amendment! He stood ace high with the prohibition element in the drys, especially the women drys, were greatly disappointed at the senior senator's attitude. 




