

R-101, A Success At Last, Is Most Luxurious Air Liner





It flies! That's Britain's answer to the criticisms of aeronautical experts who declared the R-101, largest dirigible in the world, already obsolete. From Cardington, England, where it was built, the huge ship was taken on several successful test flights, and here you see it moored in its hanger. Inset upper right is Navigation Officer E. L. Johnson, and lower left is Major Scott, commander, who maneuvered the craft with a full crew. With its full quota of 52 passengers, the R-101 is expected to cruise at about 70 miles an hour. It is most luxurious of all aircraft, and here at left are two views of its spacious "upper deck," really the second floor of the interior. A corner of the perfectly appointed dining room is pictured at the top; below is the lounge, artistically decorated, where dances can be held. Passenger cabins and a promenade also are on this level. Below are the control, wireless, and smoking rooms, kitchen and quarters for the crew.

OIL FOR THE FUTURE

Many persons wonder what will happen to the steamships, railroads and automobiles when all the oil in the world is used up. They wonder if transportation costs will not be greatly increased and operation of business and modes of living disorganized.

Any such misgivings have been without basis. The oil industry, without much ostentation, has made an ample supply of petroleum products as certain for the future as is the supply of wheat.

Indeed it may be said to be more secure, for the supply of wheat is dependent to a very great extent upon weather conditions, which are variable, while improved technique in geological exploitation, drilling practice, and more economic manufacture and use of petroleum products, together with scientific research, have made continuity of oil supply certain.

FOR A NATIONAL POLICE FORCE

Richard Enright, former police commissioner of New York City, did not exactly establish himself as a giant of a man while he held office; nevertheless, his recent suggestion for a national police system, in which city and state police organizations would come under some movement of federal regulation, is worth a lot of study.

The criminal in America is greatly helped by the fact that each police force is a separate unit. Any co-operation between the forces of two different cities is entirely voluntary. Our decentralized system gives the crook an enormous advantage.

It is only necessary to contrast ordinary police work with the work of the postal inspectors. The man who robs the U.S. mails is almost always run to earth, sooner or later. Why? Daily Washington Letter

WASHINGTON, Oct. 17,-The drinking wets of prohibition America are getting onto a home brew moonshine basis nearly everywhere. The average drinker, if he is not consuming home-brewed beer or domestic wine, is nearly always drinking whisky or gin or beer in which the kick is produced by alcohol from an illicit still.

For some time his chances of getting the "real stuff" have been down to what seems to be a mini-

These facts one gathers from autherities in the Prohibition bureau. At one time a tremendous amount of industrial alcohol was diverted into the bootlegging business, great deal of this alcohol still finds its way into the national drink supply, but not nearly so much. The government has tightened up in its supervision over industrial alcohol and it has become harder to get.

A few days after a trunk in wicker had been deposited in the baggage department of the station at Lille, in the north of France, some attendants complained of an unpleasant odor arising from the basket.

Each day it became worse. The trunk was finally opened. Pressed tightly into the wicker box was the body of a man. The legs had been bent over the chest and tied there; arms and hands were missing; the face was unrecognizable.

Police were not long in identifying the victim as Francois Rigauden, aged 33, living in Paris. They found, too, that the trunk had been sent from Paris to a non-existent address at Lille
