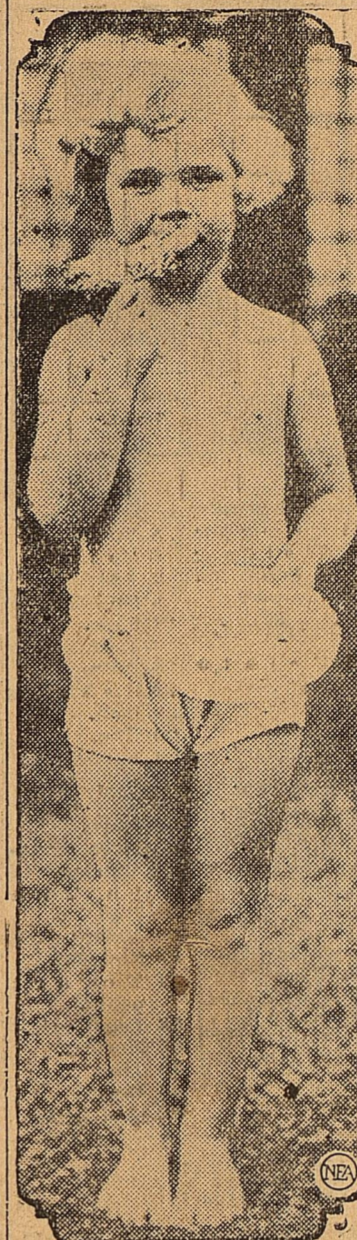

FRENCH POLICE FAIL TO SOLVE TRUNK MURDER

PARIS, Oct. 17.—(UP)—Edgar Allan Poe could not easily have conceived anything more grisly and mysterious than a crime which is now occupying the attention of police all over France and which has sent a thrill of horror through the entire nation.

A few days after a trunk in wicker had been deposited in the baggage department of the station at Lille, in the north of France, some attendants complained of an unpleasant odor arising from the basket.

Each day it became worse. The trunk was finally opened. Pressed tightly into the wicker box was the body of a man. The legs had been bent over the chest and tied there; arms and hands were missing; the face was unrecognizable.

Police were not long in identifying the victim as Francois Rigaudin, aged 33, living in Paris. They found, too, that the trunk had been sent from Paris to a non-existent address at Lille.

Another Murder Mystery

Linking threads of the story together with the thorough method for which the French Surete-Generale crime experts are renowned, the detectives made the startling discovery that the victim was the son of an old woman, who had herself been murdered some months before without the murderers being discovered.

The mother, Mme. Marie Blanc, had been killed by bullet shots at midnight in her son's home.

Belief had been expressed that Mme. Blanc had been the victim of a band of international revolutionaries, since it was known that at one time she had been conspicer to Almereyda, one of the noted Bonnet Rouge gang of anarchists. Almereyda himself had committed suicide in prison after the arrest of members of the gang, tying a noose around his neck. After the break up of the Bonnet gang, mother and son were stated to have not lost any sympathy for the revolutionary movement.

Theory of Revenge

The theory that both Rigaudin and his mother were struck down by vengeful former companions was strengthened when it became known that a day or two before the murder of the son four men called upon him at the house, where he was staying temporarily in Lille. They were all foreigners. A woman in black also called.

Following their visit, Rigaudin received a telegram making an appointment outside Paris. He left Lille and nothing was heard of him until the finding of his body in the station baggage room. That he went to Paris seems evident, since the trunk containing his remains was sent from the Gare du Nord at Paris by a person unknown.

Rigaudin worked as an accountant for several small firms and was not a rich man. Neither had his mother any wealth. What, then, could be the motive of the double murder if not political? Every possible clue has been sifted by the eagle-eyed French officers, but the assassins have vanished.

AN ORDINANCE

An ordinance of the City of Midland regulating the movement and stopping of vehicles of all kinds at certain designated intersections where traffic stop signs are located and where they may be located in the future; repealing all other ordinances in conflict therewith; and creating an emergency.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Midland:

SECTION 1. Vehicles of all kinds, before entering into the streets named below at the intersections as designated herein, where traffic stop signs are located, and at points where traffic stop signs may be located in the future, must come to a full and complete stop.

Main Street at Missouri Avenue, west approach; Main Street at Wall Street, east and west approach; Main Street at Texas Avenue, east and west approach; Texas Avenue at Loraine Street, north and south approach.

The term "vehicle" as used herein includes every automobile, wagon, carriage, omnibus, motorcycle, bicycle, and every other vehicle whether propelled by motor power, main power, horse power or by any other means.

SECTION 2. Any person who shall violate this ordinance, shall upon

conviction, be punished by a fine in any sum not to exceed One Hundred (\$100.00) Dollars.

SECTION 3. This ordinance shall also apply to any other street intersections and other points where traffic stop signs may be located in the future.

SECTION 4. All ordinances and parts of ordinances in conflict with this ordinance or any part thereof are hereby repealed.

SECTION 5. The fact that there exists an urgent need for more adequate traffic control to protect the lives and property of the citizens of the City of Midland, creates an emergency and imperative public necessity that the rule requiring that ordinances be read on three several days be suspended and the same is done, and this ordinance shall take effect and be in force from and after its passage as provided by law.

Be it ordained by the City Council of the City of Midland:

SECTION 1. Vehicles of all kinds, before entering into the streets named below at the intersections as designated herein, where traffic stop signs are located, and at points where traffic stop signs may be located in the future, must come to a full and complete stop.

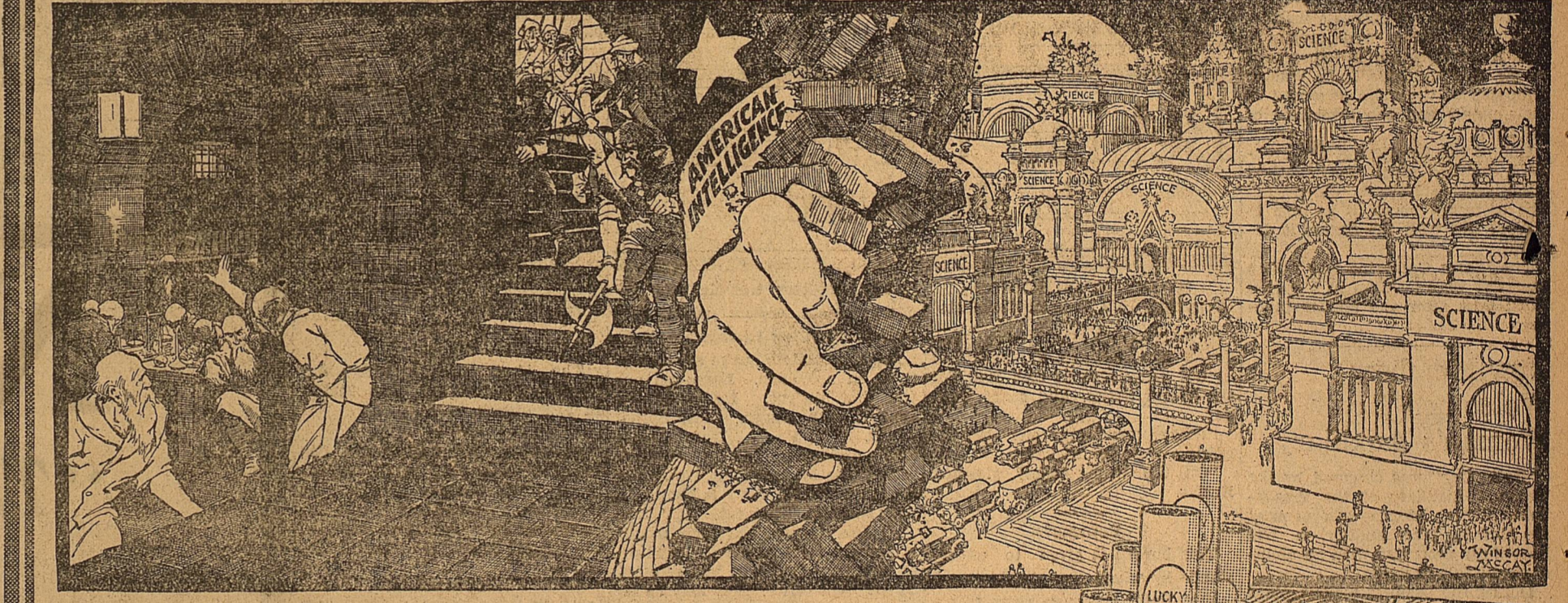

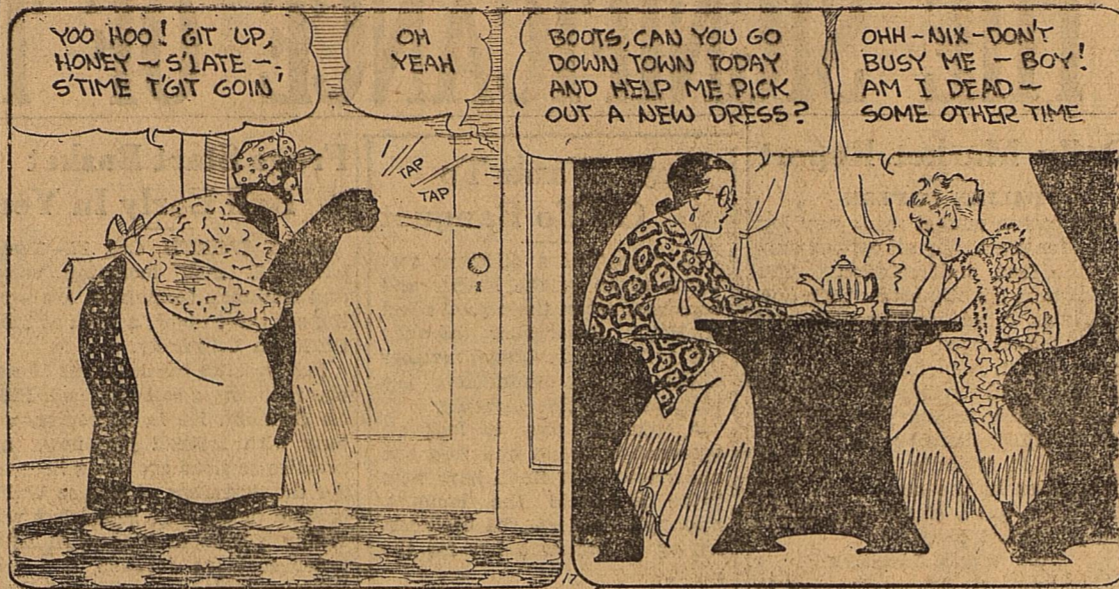

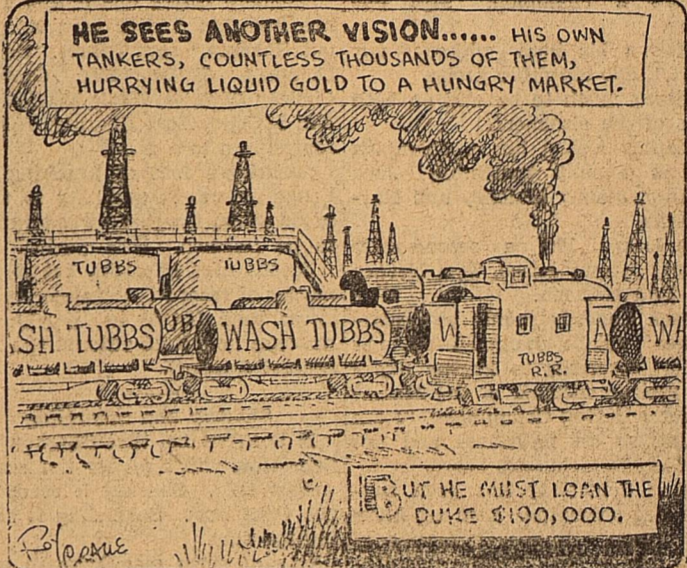

Production Is Off 48,950 Barrels

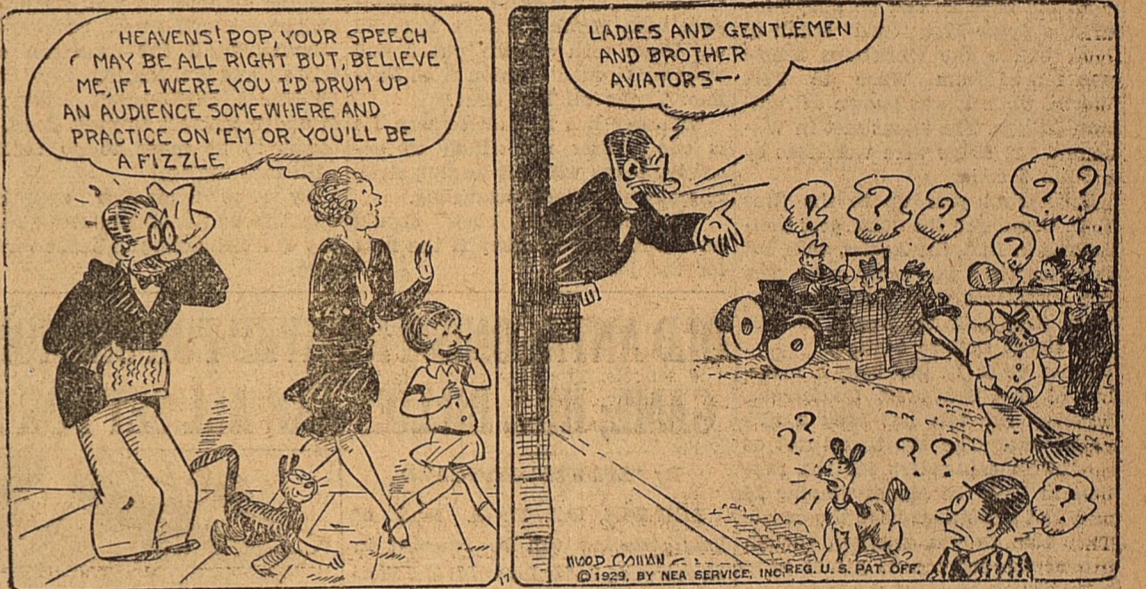
NEW YORK, Oct. 17.—The daily average gross crude oil production in the United States decreased 48,950 barrels, for the week ended October 12, totaling 2,838,100 barrels, says the weekly summary of the American Petroleum Institute. The daily average production east of California was 1,965,600 barrels, a decrease of 45,150 barrels. Refineries representing 95.4 per cent of the estimated daily potential refining capacity, operating at 84.3 per cent of their capacity, reported daily average run of crude oil to stills as 2,788,400 barrels. Daily average the previous week was 2,726,000 barrels for refineries representing 94.4 per cent of potential capacity operating at 83.3 per cent of their capacity.
