Orderly Development of Hobbs Oil Area "Insisted Upon"

No Report from Montana Flier's Trans-Ocean Attempt

Should Have Reached Irish Coast By 8 A. M. Today

NEW YORK, Oct. 23.— (UP)-At noon today, Urban F. Diteman had gone 25 hours from Harbor Grace, Newfoundland, in his announced attempt to fly to London, without being reported at any point. Therefore, unless he has landed at some isolated spot on the Irish coast, or elsewhere to the other side, he must have landed at sea.

Weather on the Irish coast thickened this afternoon, with mist, fogs and wind faorable. All ships have been requested to watch for the flier piloting the tiny plane which is powered with 110horse power motor.

Estimating that Diteman averaged at least 100 miles an hour for the first 21 hours, he should have reached the Irish coast at 8 a. m. The distance is 1,800 miles.

FUEL FOR 25 HOURS

HARBOR GRACE, Newfoundland, Oct. 23.-(P)-Urban F. Diteman Jr., Montana cattleman who traces his ancestry to Sir Francis Drake English sea adventurer, was presumed to be far out over the Atlantic today on his solo flight to Lon-

He took off yesterday at noon in his small monoplane, the Golden Hind, carrying 165 gallons of fuel which the flier estimated to be sufficient for 25 hours.

His plane was last seen ten minutes after his takeoff, heading out to sea. Airmen estimated that from 25 to 30 hours would be required for the 2,300 mile flight.



The Midland municipal airport has been designated a Government airport, according to a special story bearing a Washington dateline sent

the Dallas News. Such a designation has been worked for for months by Midland. It has been more or less understood that Midland was trying to influence an army hangar being established, and that nspection officials have landed their planes at Sloan field for the express purpose of evaluating the port in terms of future army ad-

Army To Build

Under the terms of a contract understood to have been drawn, the army would supply material for a hangar. Midland would build this and would use the hangar for storing not only army, but civilian and commercial planes. Midland would collect hangar rent from private and commercial planes.

W. H. Sloan, manager of Sloan field, said this morning when interviewed, "Yes, it's practically settled that Midland is to get the army meterological station and possibly a radio station—at least for the fu-

ture, if not soon." Sloan said Major Kennedy and Lieut. Foster, who have visited Midland during the last few weeks, assured him that Midland is the logical point for an army station and that they felt sure such a designa-

The chamber of commerce, aero club, and airport officials have been trying for a year to interest the army in the decision.

It is pointed out that Midland is the point from which ramification lines to San Antonio, Shreveport, Dallas, and Ft. Sill could with advantages be established. Sloan will release for publication
