Calhoun in Speech Here Brands Allred as Incompetent

EXPENSIVE HE CHARGES

Answers Allred Plea For Reelection on His Merits

Clem Calhoun, lawyer and soldier, widely known as the man who cleaned up the "bad lands" of Borger, carried his candidacy for attorney general of Texas into Midland last night. He spoke in the court house square. Judge J. M. Caldwell introduced the speaker.

Friends and supporters of the candidate came from McCamey, Abilene and San Angelo in order to hear the noted prosecutor, He speaks tonight

Calhoun wasted no time in hurling the gage of battle squarely at Attorney General James V. Allred, his principal opponents. He made the flat charge that Allred is "a tax-eater who plays politics with a public trust."
"He has the imperial ambition and instincts of a dictator who would

"He has the imperial ambition and instincts of a dictator who would further centralize government and rob the people of the right of home rule," Calhoun declared. "He is spending the people's money wand careless disregard of these depressing times. Already he has spent about \$100,000 more than the office cost the people under his predecescost the people under his predecessor, and his record is one of personal publicity and public bluff. He is all bark and no bite, is 'Jazz-Boy' Jimmie."

Calhoun charged that Allred had "betrayed the great mass of overburdened people he had promised to befriend." He explained that indictment as follows:

"Jimmie's meddlesome attempt to cheat the poor people of their exemption from payment of penalties and burdensome interest on delinquent taxes," said Calhoun, "convicts him of gross sacrifice of the public welfare in favor of his personal and political career. I refer to his efforts to invalidate the law passed by the legislature to permit penalties and interest on taxes delinquent up to and including Oc-



Fifteen guests attended. sistant resin and that the best treatment for it is a mechanical one. That is, the resin which is deposited on the skin in very tiny particles should be dissolved off by a mixture of ether and alcohol. Care must be taken not to spread the poison by the use of this solvent. The mixture should be applied with absorbent cotton which when used is discarded. Several applications should be made to insure the removal of the resin, and then the surface should be dried with another piece of dry cotton. After this treatment has been sufficiently repeated, stearate of zinc may be applied to relieve irritation.

People are canning now that never before thought of providing supplies in this manner, according to several county women. Maids will call and ask for certain recipes to be followed in the process.

Many String Beans

General information in canning for use by those interested has been prepared and is given with several recipes in the following paragraphs. Select only fresh, clean, sound vegetables or fruits in excellent condition. Can them as soon as possible after they are gathered. Wash all containers—sterilize them if the open kettle is used. Grade the management of the construction of the cons one kettle is used. Grade the materials if an even product is desired. Wash material clean of all soil.

The open kettle method is usually used for jellies, preserves, conserves, fruits, butters, ketchup, relishes, pickles, fruits and tomatoes. By this method the food material is sterilization.
