HOLCOMBE Case Up Before Judge

Klapproth In Stanton

King Reed, former Mid land chief of police, will go to trial Thursday in Stanton district court for his alleged part in the shooting to death of former Night Watchman J. C. Holcombe several months ago.

Holcombe and Reed staged their battle at the corner of Wall and South Bair street, and when the smoke of their guns had drifted away Holcombe lay dead, pierced through the heart by a slug from a .45 calibre revolver and Reed was weakly leaning against a concrete column of a garage, shot in the abdomen.

Motive Not Known

Only one witness seems to have been present at the shooting. Bill Chilton, former Lamesa peace officer, was with Reed, sitting in Reed's automobile while the fight was waged.


Statements given out immediately following the shooting were few and not particularly revealing. Chilton gave out the statement that the gun batle was waged in the dark, and on the other side of a car parked between the car in which he sat and the two officers.

In the Thomas hospital, after Reed had waged a long fight for life, the former chief of police told a reporter of Midland's daily paper that he "will have something to say later on. I think it best to give out nothing concrete at the present."

Town Is Wrong "The whole town has been believing something which is not true. I shot Holcombe, it's true, but there was a totally different reason than that advanced in the theory of those who merely discussed the case.'
