Pure Seed Saves Money For Farmer

Only 1,600 pounds of cotton raised with pure bred seed planted by John Reithnayer, Midland farmer living seven miles south of town, were required to make a 550 pound bale.

Ordinary gin run seed planted on the same farm required 1,-800 pounds of cotton to make a 525 to 550 pound bale. The pure bred seed cost Reith-

mayer from \$2.50 to 2.75 a bushel, but increased his profit over 12 percent. This Midland farmer will waste no more energy and time planting ordinary seed.



The Shearers, the Grundys and their brethren seem to be our real rulers.

But, as Dutcher proves, it used to be a whole lot worse

There were, for instance, the land grabs of the old northwest territory.

Millions of acres of virgin land went to selfish specu-The agents who put these conscienceless steals through Congress could hardly be called lobbyists, they simply indulged in free and easy bribery, and they didn't bother very much to conceal it.

Then there was the question of "assumption"-the issue whether the new federal government should assume the debts of the various revolutionary states and redeem call, a suspicion rife in the land that with his policy of secrecy for tax the war-time continental paper money, which had de- as long as Uncle Mellon remained refunds. After ten days in office preciated so greatly that the slang expression, "not worth in charge of the national finances Hoover stood Mellon on his head by a continental" became a byword.

Congressmen, cabinet ministers and their friends went around and bought up vast quantities of this paper money and of the old state notes. Then, with a brazenness that could not be duplicated today, they forced the assumption measure through Congress and enriched themselves vastly. The affair smelled to heaven-but the na- resign tion seemed to take it as a matter of course.

Then there were the railroad lobbies. 




