

WASHINGTON-The latest phase of the never-ending fight over electric power concerns the valuable power site owned by the Flathead Indians in Montana. The issue is

This site is worth somewhere beween \$50,000,000 and \$100,000,000 and is sometimes called "the Muscle Shoals of the Northwest."

The government has been trying feller: to hand it to the Electric Bond & Share Co. for the last couple of Electric Bong & Share.

Power Trust May Lose

But always there has been someone to step in and make a holler at the critical moment and now in the end the "power trust" may lose out. There is not any thought of letting the government build and operate a power plant at the Flathead as Muscle Shoals fights. The case deos, however, involve the integrity of the Federal Power Commission, which has been involved before.

Under the power company's offer the Flathead Indians would have had one-third of the payments on the site and white settlers twothirds. More than two years ago someone got President Coolidge to propose legislation which would allow former Secretary of the Interior Work to divide the royalties with the whites. Senator Wheeler of Montana had this provision knocked out of the appropriation bill passed by the House. Then, when Wheeler was in China and Senator Tom Walsh in Europe, the ower company came and got Work and the Indian Bureau and the Power Commission to agree to give t a preliminary permit which virtually meant awarding a lease for the next 50 years. No one had bothered to consult the Indian

Presumably the thing would have gone through had not J. W. Anderson, Wheeler's secretary, got wind of it and gone rushing to Work with vigorous protests. Then Senators Borah, Howell, Frazier and Norris got in on the play and Walsh cabled from Europe demanding that nothing be done until all nterested parties had been properv heard

Since then the Power Commision hasn't awarded the site, but t tentatively turned down the only oidder; Walter Wheeler, a Minneapolis engineer under whose bid the Indians would get \$1.50 per orsepower—a difference of many millions in the next 50 years. A. A. Grorud, counsel for the Flatheads, who has been here constantly fighting to protect their interests, favors the Wheeler bid as fairer to the owners. The American Farm Burean Federation supports the bid because of Wheeler's plans for mak-



WASHINGTON, Nov. 8 .- (UP)-The much-disputed question of the power of congress to regulate expenditures and other details of primaries in which nominees to federal offices are named, is to be decided again by the Supreme

A reversal or a re-affirmation of the famous 5-to-4 Newberry decision in 1921 is expected in the case of Former Rep. Harry M. Wurzbach, Repn. Texas. The court has just granted a hearing of the government appeal from a Texas district court's action in quashing

the indictment against Wurzbach. The Wurzbach indictment charged he violated the law by receiving political campaign contributions from federal office-holders.

Different Law Involved

In the Newberry case a different law was involved, that restricting expenditures in a primary in which senatorial candidates were named. In the Newberry case the Su preme Court, and in the Wurzbach case the Texas district court, held that acts of congress cannot reg ulate primaries. Primaries wer held not to be "elections" and
