The Newest Portrait Of-SHELL TO DRILL **DEEP TEST SOON IN WARD COUNTY**

Loving County Also Has Activity In All Operations

Interest of oil men in this section of the Permian Basin of West Texas has turned to Ward and Loving counties, where much activity is reported. A deep test in Ward county and new locations in Loving county are basis for most of the interest.

The Shell oil company will begin drilling a deep offset test to Shipley oil company's Section 17, Block 5, H. & T. C. Ry. company survey, Ward county holdings. The company geologists believe there are deep pay horizons there. This well is to be drilled to the southeast of the Shipley holdings.

Shipley has nine producers in the section, all producing around 100 barrels from what is known as the Shipley sand. Other wells will be drilled if Shell strikes deep pay. Shell has already announced it

will drill 3,500 feet or deeper. Production is found at 2,500 feet generally in section 17, sweet oil of \$4 to 38 gravity being struck.

The Penn-Atlantic well to the northwest is making 180 barrels; southeast of the Shell deep test, on Section 11, Block 5 is the Alpine Oil and Development company's John H. Boogher, No. 1, and another well is to be drilled on the Dakan 10-

Territory May Show Largest Gain In Population

WASHINGTON, Nov. 13. -(AP)-Phocian C. Beard of San Angelo today was selected by the census director as supervisor for the 1930 federal census for the counties of Andrews, Coke, Crane, Crockett, Ector, Glasscock, Howard, Irion, Loving, Martin, Midland, Mitchell, Nolan, Reagan, Schleicher, Sterling, Sutton, Tom Green, Upton, Ward and Winkler. Beard's headquarters for the work will be in San Angelo.

INCREASE IS ENORMOUS

The territory covered in the work to be supervised by Beard will furnish probably the most interesting changes over the last consus of any part of the state, and probably of the nation.

Midland, for instance, had a population of 1,795 in 1920, with slightly less than 2,500 in the county. Crane county had 35 residents then.

Figures compiled here a year ago, and population figures based on utility users, indicate that the gain in Midland will be from 300 to 400 per cent.

Much of the other territory in Beard's area will show similar gains. as the counties of Crane, Upton, Winkler and Ward now have towns of several thousand people where ere were almost no





A CASE FOR CLEMENCY

In Georgia a 71-year-old woman is under sentence of electrocution, having been convicted of plotting with a young man the murder of a printer in order to get \$14,000 insurance which the victim carried.

There aren't any mitigating circumstances. The crime was revolting and callous-murder for gain, pure and simple.

And yet, despite that fact, we have a feeling that the ends of justice will be served better if the state of Georgia spares this woman's life than if it executes her. Surely, the community will not be any better off if a gray-haired old woman-no matter what her crime-is strapped in an electric chair and put to death.

A commutation of sentence to life imprisonment seems in order-to our point of view, at any rate.


THE RED MAN GETS WISE

In fact there might have been two Governor Pollards, if Former Attorney General Claude Pollard had not recently abandoned his political ambitions to become general counsel for Texas rail lines. Incidentally there is a striking resemblance between the Texas and Goxernor-elect John G. Pollard of Virginia. Their mannerisms are particularly similar, though their relationship is distant.

Pollard could have fulfilled the straight voting requirements. He probably would have been acceptable, too, to those who voted for Hoover and the state Democratic ticket, for while supporting the ticket himself, he did not penalize members of his department who took an opposite view.
