Oklahoma Miners Buried Today As Many Bereaved

Attention of the entire country was turned today to two great human tragedies which have happened during the week.

Efforts were being made today to recover the bodies of ten sailors who were thought to have gone down in the Atlantic yesterday when the steamer Fort Victoria and Algonquin collided in a blinding fog.

ASHORE, four investigators started into the disaster, which caused a loss of \$1,250,000 to the ships, \$250,000 to the cargo and uncounted personal loss to passengers, all of whom were rescued.

McALESTER, Okla., the task of burying the bodies of 59 miners, killed in one of the worst disasters in the history of Oklahoma coal mining started today.

BRECK AND PORT ARTHUR UPSET TRADITION BY FINAL GAME

Baylor University Expects to Have a Good Basketball Team This Year

FIRST TIME IN YEARS THAT UNKNOWN QUANTITIES PLAY EACH OTHER FOR CHAMPIONSHIP

When Port Arthur and Breckenridge meet Saturday on Waco's Cotton Palace gridiron, it will mark the first time since early history of the Texas Interscholastic League that two elevens have been brought together in the finals who have never experienced the thrill of a state championship. Abilene, Waco and Oak Cliff of Dallas have hogged the titles in previous years, says a sports writer in the Star-Telegram.

They have been pushed aside and a new high school eleven will rule. Port Arthur has been in the finals, reaching that stage against Abilene in 1928. It is the first adventure for the Breckenridge Buckaroos past the district.

Since Cleburne and Houston Heights battled to a scoreless tie in 1920, inaugural year of the Texas Interscholastic League, the finals

have seen a member of the Waco, Oak Cliff or Abilene dynasty. Oak Cliff made its advent in 1921, dropping a 35 to 13 decision to the Bryan, Texas, high school.

See Waco and Abilene. In the following year Waco and Abilene made bids for admittance into the royal court. Waco was accepted with a 13 to 10 victory over Abilene at the old Panther Park here. The succeeding year found Abilene a member, the Eagles defeating Waco 3 to 0 on a water soaked field in Dallas.

Since the years of 1922 and 1923 Waco and Abilene have won the distinction of having reached the finals and won more titles than any other high school of the State. Waco has been in the finals six times, winning four championships. Abilene has reached the same stage on four occasions, grabbing off two titles, while Oak Cliff follows with one championship in three attempts. Oak Cliff won its only title in 1924, handing Waco a 31 to 0 drubbing. It is the largest score that has ever been run up against a Tiger eleven.

Tigers Come Back
The failure in 1924 didn't dampen the Tigers' spirit. They came back to win the flag for three succeeding years, 1925, 1926, and 1927. Forest of Dallas fell, 20 to 7 in 1925, while Oak Cliff was the victim by

But to duplicate history Port Arthur must defeat one of the strongest elevens ever to reach the finals—Breckenridge. The Buckaroos have been established as the favorites over the South Texas entry.

Both of these men will be playing their fourth year for the Cowboys next season. Both were placed on the all-Texas Conference team in 1928 and Pearce was re-named for that honor the past season. Sanders attracted attention in the 1928 season with his phenomenal punting and promises to turn in his best performance as a halfback during the 1930 season. Pearce distinguished himself, not only as a great defensive tackle, but as a fair ground gainer on the tackle around play used by the Cowboys.

Rufus Hyde, captain the past year, and four letter man will be the only men missing when the Cowboys line up again next fall.

MEN O' WAR

U. S. Navy's Strength in Submarines Exceeds Britain's, Though Ships Are Smaller

EDITOR'S NOTE: This is the fifth in a series of articles by Rodney Dutcher discussing the strength of the U. S. navy, especially as it compares with the British navy. It is especially timely in view of the approaching naval arms conference at London.

The new type of naval vessel which the world best remembers as a result of the war is the submarine, whose primary purpose is to attack enemy ships on the surface with torpedoes.

The submarine also does scouting work, stays at sea in enemy waters for long periods and preys on commerce. It submerges by filling large tanks to destroy buoyancy and maintains a proper depth by steering up and down with horizontal diving rudders.

Its armament includes from four to eight or more torpedo tubes and a deck gun of from three to five inches caliber. Tonnage varies all the way from one of 99 tons built by Finland to a 3200-tonner launched by the French.

The U. S. Navy's largest subs are the V boats, fleet submarines running up to 2680 tons. Most American submarines, however, are S boats of between 850 and 900 tons. A submarine's personnel runs from 40 to 85 men.

The average cost of the S boats was around \$1,750,000 apiece, but the

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
