WASHINGTON, Jan. 13. -(AP) - Reserving judgment on ultimate prohibition conclusions, the law enforcement commission in a preliminary report sent congress today recommended that the national prohibition law be strengthened immediately in the interest of promoting observance of and respect for

In the town of Shrewsbury, N. J., there stood until recently a fine row of 13 sycamore trees, planted seven years before the Revolutionary War by patriots as symbols of the colonies.

A few days ago the head of the town council decided that two of these trees were menaces to traffic, and forthwith had them chopped down and removed.

Shrewsbury promptly got indignant and passed around a petition of protest. But the trees, being down, could not be restored, and the petitions served no purpose except to express the citizens' anger.

Generally Improved Conditions For 1930, Though It Warns That Changes for the Better Won't be Uniform Throughout the Nation.

WASHINGTON .- There is a wide variation of industrial-employment enditions over the country, but only in few fields is there no more hopeful prospect during the coming year, according to a general forecast of the U.S. Employment Service.

Predictions include a good outlook for skilled labor in California and Georgia but not so good for unskillproved labor demand in Kansas, 1929 in Massachusetts, great imditions by spring in Pennsylvania hoped for in Rhode Island. when construction programs start,

Pennsylvania expects the recession to continue briefly into 1930, with a gradual upward trend likely to regain the 1929 levels. Fairly satisfactory schedules and some expansions are predicted for Indiana. Metal manufacturing is better off than a year ago in Wisconsin and an equally good year is forecasi for New Jersey.
