Conspirators To Have Blown Up Public Buildings

MEXICO CITY, Jan. 28 -(AP) - Mexico City police claimed today to have frustrated a plot to assassinate President Emilio Portes Gill and President-elect Pascual Ortiz Rubio, to blow up several public buildings and to seize administration of the government.

Of 119 persons arrested, 17 are said to have confessed connection with the plot. The two released were women who proved their innocence.



STEPS TAKEN TO **IMPROVE MILK IN MIDLAND COUNTY**

Following announcement that the city council had passed a pure milk ordinance here, Midland county dairymen are having to make several changes in physical equipment for handling milk, and a creamery here has ordered \$7,000 in new milk treating equipment.

"There will be plenty of changes in the way milk is handled in Midland county within the next three or four weeks," a member of the county-city health board said to the Reporter-Telegram this morning. The board member said Dr. W. E.

Ryin would go to Stanton Sunday for testing milk-handling conditions and methods in Martin county. It is thought that milk from that county will be used extensively in Midland until dairymen of this county can supply plenty of grade A milk.

Reports from Martin county show that Midland can get about 300 gallons of milk from that area each day. It is proposed to pasteurize the milk here and sell it.

Much has been done since the passing of the ordinance to acquaint local dairymen with provisions which must be met. Literature has been mailed from the state sanitary department to them and it is believed that within a comparativebeen much improved in this coun-


