



To begin with, it carries a stock of mechanical "lungs", invented by Lieutenant Charles B. Momsen, a submarine officer. The lung is a rubberized bag with a capacity approximating that of a person's lungs, a rubber mouthpiece and a series of valves. Before using, the wearer fills the bag with oxygen from a tank in the submarine;

The federal authorities have never prosecuted anyone for giving away a lone drink or even two, they say, but the offense is theoretically punishable.

It is against the law to carry liquor on the hip-or elsewhere on the person or in a vehicle-because that is denominated a felony under the Jones act and is punishable by up to five years' imprisonment and a \$10,000 fine, though these penalties are designed to apply to large-scale opclators.

It is a violation of the Volstead act to have liquor in one's home unless obtained before the prohibition law went into effect. This is also legally a misdemeanor and may be punished by as much as a \$500 fine for the first offense The government holds that a prison who buys liquor and arranges for its delivery, is guilty of conspiracy to violate the law. although this point has not yet been decided by the supreme.] COULT.
