"Out of the Red With Roosevelt and Garner"

GARNER NOMINATED AS ALL VOTES GET ON BAND WAGON

Texan Roosevelt's Running Mate



Here is the great speaker of the house of representatives, who with a good chance at being nominated for president, sacrificed himself on the altar of the party and gave his support to Roosevelt, turning the tide so that there might not

be any danger of a further deadlock and possibly resultant break in party harmony. This is John Garner of Uvalde, Texas, nominated vice president by the democrats by acclamation Saturday.

LOST FLYER WHO LANDED OFF HIS COURSE IN MEXICO AND WAS HELD BY CIVIL AUTHORITIES IS HERE

Released by the Mexican government after being held under technical arrest for several days following his landing in Mexico as a culmination of a harrowing experience spent off course over the clouds, Lieut. H. Nichols, naval aviator, reached Midland Saturday.

Apparently all but "washed out" by trudging in the desert this side of Chihuahua City before being rescued, Nichols had little to say except for his intention to check his compass and wind drift more closely. He was flying from the west coast to El Paso with four other naval planes when he became separated from the group and bore off course with his fast flying plane pushed along faster than he thought with the assistance of a good tail blow.

When the fog lifted enough for his spiraling down through an opening, he found desert below and extending to the horizon. Tired out, with food and water for only a short time, he landed and wandered away later returning and scribbling on the fuselage of the plane so other airmen might be attracted. "Landed at 1700 (which means 5 o'clock to the Mexicans, he explained here). Am without food and water. Have walked 20 miles in mountains. Could not find any town. Returned at 700. Can hold out until Thursday, Nichols."

This cryptic message was never found by airmen or Mexican rescuers, but his second trip of exploration resulted in his finding a sheep herder, who conveyed him to Chihuahua.

He took off, tired but happy, here for Hampton Roads, Va.

RESCUERS BATTLE IN FLOOD TIDE

Boys Marooned, Many Watch Helplessly During Rescue

KERRVILLE, July 2. (UP)—Rescuers battled the raging Guadalupe river today, attempting to rescue Hall Prior, 16, and Cooper Fletcher, 17. Prior was caught yesterday by a flood while he was rounding up horses in the river bottoms.

This morning a friend of Prior swam to the tree where the victim was clinging, carrying him a water proof bag of food. Search lights from a hotel were on Prior all night. Hundreds watched, unable to help.

A report that five people were drowned was not verified. There was an estimated twelve inch cloudburst in the upper reaches of the Guadalupe. Rainfall estimated at thirteen inches swelled the Leona river out of its banks at Uvalde, threatening total inundation. Streets were flooded and railroads stopped service due to wash-outs of tracks. The Brady river over flowed at Brady, causing stoppage of trains.

LIGHT SHOWER IS REPORTED IN CITY

A light shower fell early Saturday morning, gauging .93 inch at the meteorological station on Sloan field. Showers were reported at several places in the Midland trade territory.

TERRELL HOPES FOR PRICE HIKE OF CRUDE SOON

Railroad Commissioner C. V. Terrell, Wise county farm boy who went upward through successive steps to county and district attorney, county judge, state senator, and state treasurer, predicted while campaigning in Midland Saturday that oil will rise 25 cents a barrel in 30 days.

The commissioner said "hopes for that price are generally held by members of the commission."

For many years, the gray-haired official has been closely associated with affairs of government. He served two terms as county and district attorney of his native county, was county judge four years, state senator eight years, state treasurer three years and railroad commissioner seven years. He filled out an unexpired term, was elected to a term in that office and now seeks reelection. Numerous Midland oil men are actively at work for him in this area of the state.

Saturday night the commissioner spoke at Big Spring and is to be at Pailinview for an address Monday.

Terrell is remembered for numerous bills he has authored, among the more prominent of which were those establishing the North Texas Teachers college at Denton and the fellow servant bill, both of which proved of incalculable benefit.

The transition since his service in the senate may be shown by citing the change in tax rate; the rate was 6 cents compared with 32 at present, and when he left the county judge's office the county and state rate was 66 1-5 cents as compared with more than \$2 now.

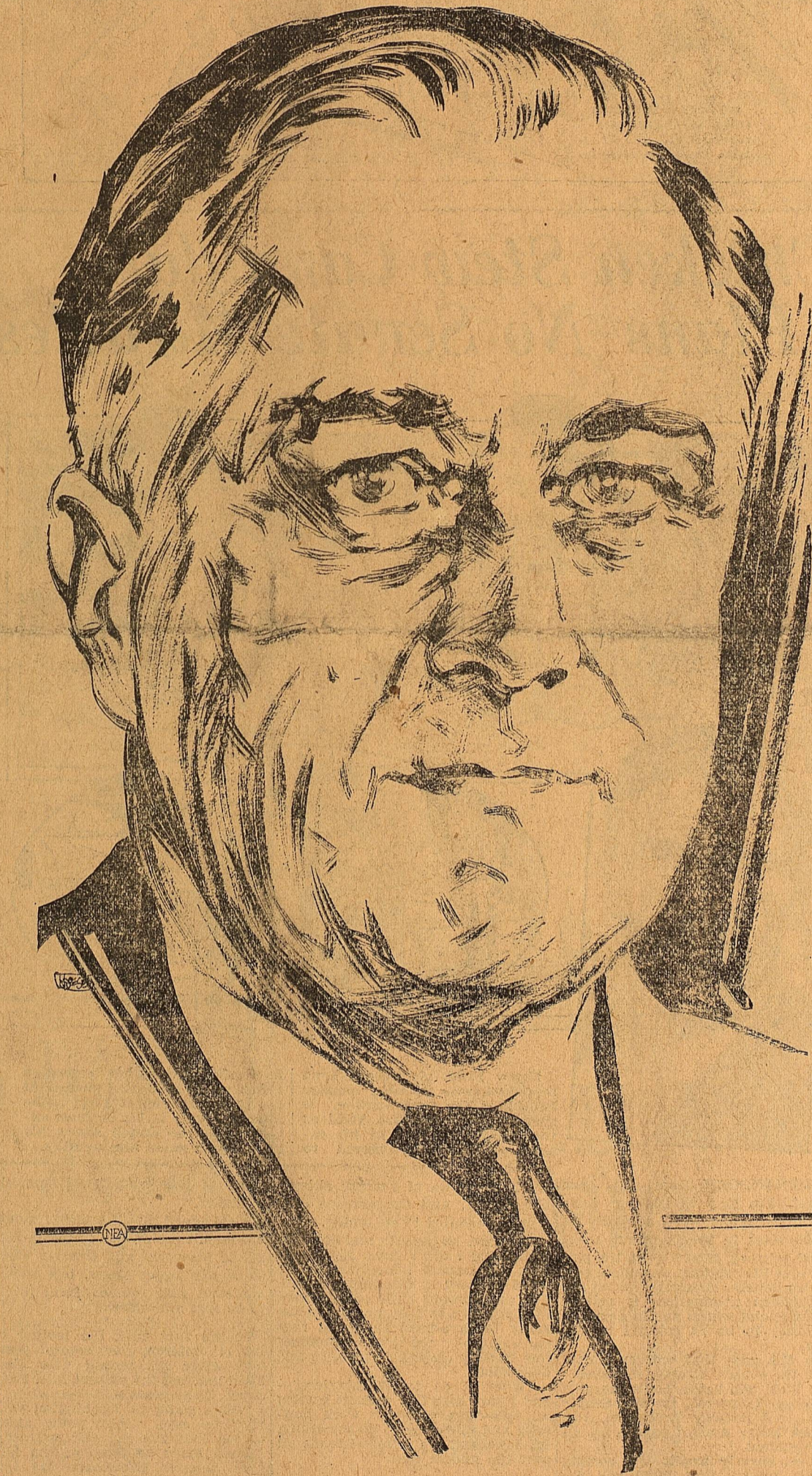
He last week issued a proration order that he says will save the oil industry \$18,000,000 a month through cutting production to 50 barrels for the first 15 days and holding to 325,000 per day for the remainder of this period. His work has resulted, Midland oil men say, in the saving of billions of dollars in the past, and he has signed every proration order issued by the commission since April, 1928. Proration, he says, is equitable preservation, little more, but shows that it has saved vast sums of money and that it has produced better prices, to the benefit of oil men, the consumer and to the University of Texas and A. & M. college.

Midland Farmer Is Interred Saturday

Funeral services were held Saturday at Greenwood cemetery for W. F. Plummer, 65, Midland county farmer who died Saturday morning from a lengthy illness occasioned by a kidney ailment.

Rites were read by the Reverend Watson. His widow, a son, John, a daughter Mrs. Earl Roberts of Westbrook, and several step children, survive. The body was prepared for burial by the Ellis mortuary.

Judge Klapproth Presides Monday

Judge Charles L. Klapproth will preside at the candidates' speaking on the west side of the court house Monday morning at 10 o'clock.

UNANIMOUS VOTE IS HUNG UP FOR TEXAN

CHICAGO, July 2. (UP)—John Garner, speaker of the house of representatives and a native Texan, was nominated by acclamation for democratic vice president this afternoon prior to the arrival of his running mate, Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt of New York.

The roll call of states was a repetition of seconds for Garner.

The only other candidate was General Mathew A. Tinley of Iowa, who withdrew at the end of the roll call, moving the nomination be made unanimous. The convention acquiesced enthusiastically.

Texas delegates could not restrain a demonstration for Garner, breaking loose with a whoop even before the roll call was completed, and all states and territories joined in the demonstration.

Representative John McDuffie, party whip in the house and an old friend of Garner, made the nominating address, describing Garner as "a red-blooded he-man and an outstanding democrat in the house." Cheers punctuated each sentence.

PRECEDENTS BROKEN BY THE DEMOCRATS

"The democratic party is now breaking precedent, while the republican leaders are breaking promises," Governor Franklin D. Roosevelt, democratic nominee for president, said upon his arrival at the Chicago convention Saturday by plane.

He explained that he was shattering all democratic party precedent by becoming the first nominee to appear before the convention before being officially notified, which takes place days after the nomination. He said he chose to do so because "I know you have nominated me" and explained that his procedure would save the party thousands of dollars. One spokesman later said it was estimated this saving would be in excess of \$100,000.

The Saturday convention was a masterpiece of drama, just as was the coup of California and Texas Friday night when William Gibbs McAdoo made his announcement relative to California shifting its support to Roosevelt, followed soon afterward by Texas, making the same announcement during the roll call. Everything bore the masterful attempt to bring undivided party harmony, and all states, including New York, New Jersey and Virginia, withdrew support of a native son and turned to the man the rest of the states with the exception of Iowa were supporting.

Tammany Chieftain Curry was made chairman of the welcoming committee for Roosevelt. No mention was made of the defeated Al Smith. Harmony and harmony alone was aimed at—and achieved.

Roosevelt made a remarkable speech before the convention. He declared he would answer any question the party directs relative to his stand, would state his positions clearly and concisely so that all may understand, and that he dedicated himself to economy and to lifting the democratic party into realization of a democratic administration.

No mention was made of McAdoo, either. It is believed by party leaders this was because of possibility of feeling between the Smith element and the anti-Smith element, the least provocation being if allowed to simmer, may crystallize into Smith's support of the nominee.

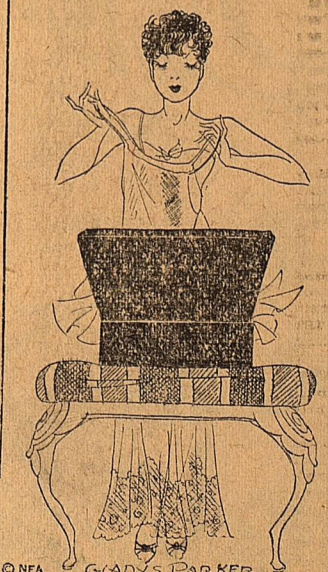
