# BRADY TRIAL CHARGE SUBMITTED Bombs Terrorize Thousands of Chicago Citizens Today

## **IS CLIMAX TO REIGN OF TERROR**

Four Gangland Murders In 4 Days Is Record

CHICAGO, Feb. 3.-(UP) -A teriffic bomb explosion rocked the entire southwest crumpled three stores and side early today, climaxing a reign of criminal terror listing four gangland murders in four days and another bombing.

Thousands of residents in a two mile radius were jarred, and the streets filled with terrorized citiblocks about.

A grocery store, the scene of the blast, was reduced to a smear of presence of the proprietors.

#### Herb Pennock's Great Pitching in World Series of 1923 Was the TURKISH Most Courageous of All Billy Evans Ever Saw; Wins Big Game Now Open for Business

Courage, as relating to baseball, is a peculiar thing to define. It is my thought that many players classed as "yellow", sportdom's term for lacking in courage, are anything but that.

Perhaps no player in baseball has been put to as severe a test as to courage than the pitcher. During a ball game he faces any number of situations, that call for the best that is in him. Courage in a pitching sense may be likened to poise. When a hurler has pitching poise he gives his best under all conditions and accepts the bitter with the sweet. Ordinarily one would suppose

that it would require a pitcher's battle to offer the greatest test for pitching courage or poise. That is not the case, although very often pitchers' battles have a number of critical situations that call for the best that the pitcher has to offer. Usually, a pitchers' battle is a game in which few men are on the bases and the hurlers dominate the game throughout, with but few critical solutions. It has always seemed to me that

it is an e asy matter to pitch when everything is breaking your way, when your delivery is such that the opposition can do but little with it. On the contrary, it is my thought, that the pitcher who keeps plugging away, giving everything he has, when all the breaks are against him, is the fellow who shows real

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



