Storms Strike With Death; Hail Near 15 Feet Deep

Injunction Restrains Petroleum Building Trustee Sale

Sweetwater Hail Is A Wrecker: Island Storm Fatal

Heavy winds, hail storms, cloudbursts and other weather phenomena caused much destruction of property in Texas and other states over Saturday and late Friday, according to wire dispatches.

The wind which blew a gale in Midland Friday night blew up heavy rainfall and sleet showers in other nerby towns, the falling ice in some places pelting property with such violence as to do considerable damage.

Hail 15 Feet Deep

SWEETWATER, May 3. (P)-Livestock was reported killed by rain. hail and wind storms in this area last night. Hail was reported drifted from four to 15 feet west of here. More than two inches of rain fell here and in other sections from a half to four inches. At Colorado ice drifts were said to be ten feet deep Highways were submerged, and a bridge washed out, but was quickly repaired, causing little traffic delay.

Hail Big as Baseballs

O'DONNELL, May 3. Buildings were damaged, orchards stripped, and considerable damage done to livestock by a tornado and hail storm which struck this section today. Hailstones as large as baseballs preceded a teriffic wind. Scores of windows were broken, Two inches of rain fell in a few hours.



Tangled Wreckage Is Evidence Of The Big Blast

FORT WORTH. May 3. (P)-Claude Gremm, 50, engineer, and J. W. Wade, fireman, were killed today when the boiler of a locomotive pulling the south-bound Texas Pacific freight train exploded two miles from Keller, near here. Gremm was of Fort Worth and Wade of

Bodies of two men, badly scalded were picked up on the highway 50 or 75 feet away. Two brakemen, G. G. Weidman, Fort Worth, and H. L. Turner, Bonham, were riding on the second car back from the locomotive, and were knocked to the ground but were unhurt.

The 50-ton boiler, hurled 300 feet away, tore a hole four feet deep in the ground when it struck, and then bounced 100 feet further, a tangled piece of steel. The train was moving slowly down a slight grade when the explosion occurred. Turner said he head a dull thud and the next he knew he was picking himself up from the ground. DECENCY AND DIVIDENDS

Every once in a while some earnest seeker after truth makes the surprising discovery that it really pays to treat workingmen like decent human beings, finding to his amazement that the employer who gives his workers more than they expect is bound to profit by his generosity.

Of course, we all ought to know this, and be sure of it, without being told. But we have a fondness for cynieism, and we don't assimilate truths like this unless they are drummed into us.

An English merchant sailor named Lennox Kerr recently spent a year and a half wandering about the United States. When he got through he wrote a book, "Back Door Guest," just published, telling of his experiences. He found things in this country to surprise and interest him; but nothing hit him quite such a wallop as the contrast between sailors on the Great Lakes' steamers and sailors on the ocean.

Kerr, a veteran salt water sailor, made several trips on a lakes ship and thought he had tumbled into sailors'

He found the lakes shippers treating sailors as if they were decent, self-respecting human beings. Crews' quarters were clean, comfortable and commodious, as compared with the dark, dirty, smelly forecastles of salt water ships. The food was beyond praise, as compared with the starvation menus of most ocean steamers. Ships' officers treated their men with consideration instead of wrapping themselves in the dignity of the sea's traditional caste

dinarily is given bad accommodations, bad food, callous treatment and ill-usage in all its forms, the lakes sailor is treated with kindness, consideration and respect.

Then he sums up the results.

First of all, it pays dividends. The lakes shippers have an eight-months season and face heavy railroad ever before. The rate of population competition—and profit as heavily as salt water shippers in the last decade was

In the second place, they get more work out of their men. The lakes sailor works longer hours and does a better job while he is at it than his salty brother. We ought to know all this without being told, of course. But we don't. It actually surprises us to learn that even sailors—traditionally a graceless class—will respond to decent treatment. Which, of course, only indicates that we are still a trifle blind.



WASHINGTON, May 3 .-- Uncle Sam is growing more slowly than smaller than that in any previous census period.

That is the opinion of veteran

The population of the United States will be found to be between as close an unofficial guess as they care to make at this time. The count may be near 122,125,000. In 1920 the nation's population was 105.710,620; in 1910, 91,972,266; in 1900, 75,994,575.

Birth control, higher living standards, later marriages, more women at work—these are the main factors which have gone with drastically restricted immigration to cut the rate of increase, accord-

The population increased 14 9 per cent between 1910 and 1920, as against 21 per cent in the previous decade. For the 1920-30 period it s likely to fall below 14 per cent. Most of the increase has been

Birth Rate Falling

The birth rate has dropped, year by year, from 23.7 births per 1000 population in 1920 to 19.7 in 1928 with an indicated further decrease for 1929. Falling birth rates have been noted in nearly all civilized


