

STAMFORD, Tex., May 20.—Selling cattle by mail order has made the old Swenson ranch one of the biggest business corporations in west

This ranch, founded in 1883 by E. P. and S. A. Swenson, has grown to corporation size, owning 225,000 acres of choice grazing lands and representing an investment of several million dollars. And the Swenson Land and Cattle Company has made most of its money by filling mail orders for Hereford cattle.

On the Swenson lands graze 28,-000 head of cattle, of which 25,000 are Herefords and 2000 shorthorns. 
