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

Secret Testimony Of Unipress

CINCINNATE, JULY 13, (UZ). -Libby Holman returned this morning to the home she left ten years ago when, as a Cincinnati university co-ed, she began her career which led to Broadway and her marriage into the wealthy Reynolds family.

WINSTON SALEM, July 13. (UP) -According to a transcript of secret testimony obtained by the United Press today, Libby Holman testified

Press today, Libby Holman testified that she believed but was not certain that she was to bear an heir to the dead husband and the Reynolds tobacco millions.

Any child borne by Libby Holman within ten months after her husband's death could claim a part of the Reynolds estate. Libby told a jury on July 8 that she had thought she was approaching motherhood since June 25.

Detectives, pursuing an investigation today, attempted to learn why three persons searching the room where Reynolds was killed had failed to find the gun until five hours later and why Libby's bedroom slipper was beside the bed of Albert (Ab) Walker, friend of Reynolds.
