Ohio Legislature Blamed by Warden for Fire Disaster

Holder in Lead as Roping Contest Goes into Finals

APPEAR IN

Ab Cooksey Ties Jake McClure For First In Open Meet

Spectators at the final day of the Holder-Bennett calf roping contest this afternoon will see the winner go up against Jake McClure, of Lovington, winner last season of the championships at Pendleton, Oregon; Chicago, New York and San Antonio, in a special match of a few calves. McClure's championship belt is coveted by ropers the world over, and those who saw him in action Saturday on his big bay, 1,300 pound, horse "Legs" look forward to the post final contest between him and the match winner today. The free for all roping contest will attract additional ropers today, it is reported, the show beginning at 2 o'clock Cowden Park

Allen Holder built up a lead of 42.3 seconds over Hugh Bennett in the first half of the two-day, 30-calf, roping contest Saturday afternoon; and A. B. Cooksey of Midland tied Jake Mc-Clure, champion calf roper at four of the nation's biggest shows last summer, for first place in the free for all roping contest.

This afternoon, beginning at 2 o'clock, the second half of the Holder-Bennett roping match will be held at Cowden Park, and another free-for-all will bring some of the fastest ropers of this section into action

Holder Has Low Mark Holder's total time for 15 calves Saturday was 402.5 seconds and Bennett's time was 444.8 seconds Holder averaged 26.8 1-3 seconds per calf against Bennett's average of 29.6 8-15. Holder's 18.6 seconds for one calf was the low mark of the matched roping contest, but this was beaten in the free for all roping by Ab Cooksey and Jake Mc-Clure with 18.1, and Hugh Ben-

nett with 18.4 seconds. In the matched contest, Holder had to use two loops on the second calf and again on the fourth calf; but this was offset by Bennett's having to resort to four loops on his seventh calf. These were the only missed throws of the rope in the matched contest.

Holder used his famous horse, Coon Dog, throughout the match, and Bennett used his equally well known Hazel Eyes. Both ponies performed wonderfully, bringing the admiration of the stands in their manner of keeping the rope taut and working with the ropers.

Cooksey Tied McClure

Eight fast ropers competed in the free for all match, each man roping one calf. Jake McClure and Ab Cooksey split the first and second money with time of 18.1 seconds each. Hugh Bennett got third with 18.4; Myrl Jowell, no time, missed first loop; Allen Holder, fourth, 19.1; Jack Young fifth, 21.9; Will Nix sixth, 22.7 seconds; Bill Wyche, no time, missed first loop; Vergil Ray, no time, "rained out." These ropers and several others, it is believed, will compete in the free for all contest this afternoon.

PRISON A FIRE TRAP

Only Witness Called As Quiz Before Committee

COLUMBUS, Ohio, April 26 (P) — Warden Preston E. Thomas asserted today before the governor's investigation committee that the Ohio legislature alone is responsible for the state's overcrowded prisons and for maintenance of fire traps such as that in which 320 Ohio penitentiary convicts lost their lives last Monday.

COLUMBUS, Ohio. April 26. (A)-Governor Myers Cooper's commission investigating the Ohio peni tentiary fire which took 320 live planned to resume investigation late today with Warden Preston Thomas as the only witness. The situation within the penitentiary was very quiet. Deputy Warden Woodward, after a talk with prisoners, said they promised to remain orderly.

A slight disorder in the yard late today caused excitement but was quieted quickly. Charles Mithoefer, gangster, serving life for first degre murder, attempted to enter the idle house, but was pushed back. He plunged for the door trying to swing it open, but was unsuccessful.

Bert Weir Would Take "Fles" To Calgary Stampede

Bert Weir, of Monument, N. M., here this week end to officiate as tie judge in the Holder-Bennett roping contest, related anecdotes of the early days of cowpunching with Midland men Saturday which will appear in a feature story in Monday's issue of The Reporter-Telegram.

Weir is arena director of the famous rodeo called the Stampede, at Calgary, Canada. The date this summer will be July 7 to 12, and Weir is making efforts to have as many as 25 men go from the Midland area in a special car. Terms of the trip are reasonable, he says, and he has turned the data over to Spence Jowell of Midland to secure the passengers.

The Stampede is the "daddy of them all," Weir says, and he advises Midland people to ask Tom Nance and wife, who made the trip last summer, about the reodeo and the scenic attractions in the Canadian

Weir joined the local Fle lodge Friday night and says he believes the organization would do well in Canada as there are a lot of Texans there. "I don't know what their names

were in this country," he added. The Calgary Stampede, having an attendance of 87,732 in 1922, had grown to an attendance of 264,321 last summer, and Weir says that if 250,000 attend next July the officials will be satisfied, as this has been one of the worst years for that section.
