

American people are a touring people. Those liv-ing near the seashore want to see the mountains, and those in the mountains want to see the coast. The vacation tourist business is tremendous, and the Broadway of America gets a great share of it.

"On top of that, the route is all-year, and in addition to vacation tourists there are the thousands of people driving on business trips, some only a short distance, and some across the continent.

Midland and adjacent counties have a strip of the highway that helped make this transcontinental tourist business possible, and now this very strip of road is in danger of touring traffic over another route.

This may be called bad advertising, but it is a fact, and the facts must be faced.

Unless the Broadway of America through this section is widened and made safer, decreasing the accidents which recently have amounted to almost one daily, there s serious danger of losing highway traffic as well as the danger that threatens of loss of life and property.

Midland people are faced with a problem that must be met and met soon. The very accidents themselves are all the argument that should be needed, but the serious condition must be brought to the attention of those who have authority to consruct or improve highways, and must be brought forcibly.

This figure is furnished by Dr. Julius Klein, assistant secretary of commerce. He finds that there are now between 110,000 and 125,000 roadside camps; that more than half of them keep open all the year around and that new ones are being added at the rate of 3,000 a year.


It isn't the size of this business that is interesting, however, so much as it is the meaning back of it. The number of tourists must be simply stupendous for the hot dog stand and pop sales to rise to half a billion dollars. That sales figure reflects a spread of the vacation habit greater than anything the world has ever known before.

The surface of the earth has been pretty well furrowed, in the course of history, by the migrations of its peoples; but was there ever anything like this annual migration of Americans and Canadians? Millions of men, women and children go roving every summer. They make the wanderings of the romantic gypsies look puny. They cover a whole continent.

Dwellers in the interior go spinning off to see what the oceans look like; coast folk swing over the mountains and have a look at the midlands. Mountains and lakes and rivers and sea beaches and deserts slide under the wheels of a million cars, and provincialism goes out of existence under a million sets of rubber tires. The whole nation shuffles itself each year, and Mr. Average Citizen, perched behind his steering wheel does more traveling in one month than his ancestors did in all their lives-and does it in incomparably greater comfort.



Mountain to Bear Wants Job; Cannot Name Midland Boy

A mountain pinnacle in far-away Alaska is to be named in honor of the late Eugene F. Burkett, son of the Rev. J. C. Burkett, of Abilene, former Midland pastor, says the Abilene News, which goes on to say: Young Burkett, a naval lieutenant, made the first air mapping expedition ever conducted by the United States into Alaska, directing aerial surveys covering 23,000 square miles. Lieutenant Burkett and Ensign John B. Clark of Chicago were instantly killed January 7, 1930, when




