

"Open Stock" By WILLIAM H. BALDWIN,

When a store keeps on hand a sufficient stock of a pattern and permits purchase of single pieces at any time, the pattern is known as "open stock." Conversely, patterns which can be bought only in sets are closed stock. It is

therefore obvious that the wise shopper will limit her selection to open stock offerings. This is particularly true in the cases of glass and china, because breakage is a considerable item in the housekeeper's budget

It is well to know exactly what a store means when it advertises open stock. No store can be expected to keep in stock any one pattern in perpetuity. Some stores keep a pattern in stock for five years. They keep careful records of the names and addresses of all purchasers of each pattern and as that pattern is to be discontinued, these purchasers are notified of the impending discontinuance and thus are given full opportunity to replace damaged pieces or to buy reserve
