LANDING FIELD IS "PERFECT"

"Sloan field is the best landing field I ever saw," an army officerr remarked here this week when questioned about the local port. He added that with its expanse of devel terrain, its ease of approach from any direction or angle without danger of striking obstacles that often serve as a menace to safe landing, the field could accommodate almost any number of ships at a time, and that, in short, it is perfect.

This opinion from seasoned army flyers has been expressed by some of the outstanding aviators of the na-tion. Chas. A. Lindbergh said "You have a wonderful field here," which was quite a statement from one as conservative as he.

Not only is the landing field perfect, but new airport equipment is being added daily by the owners and by the army, making of Sloan field one of the most important air terminals of the nation.

CRIME IN THE MONTH'S NEWS

Crime played too prominent a part in Texas during the month of May. Mob outrages at Sherman and Honey Grove vied with the Brady trial at Dallas for prominence in the Texas press.

These incidents had barely lost front page position when from Houston came the news that a more or less notorious aviator had been "taken for a ride" in the approved Chicago style.

Municipal and county authorities at Houston have displayed commendable energy in prosecuting the search for the murderer or murderers of Aviator Edwards. The hunt has been extended to cover the entire continent. Indictments have been returned. As yet, however, it is not known that the guilty parties are confined behind steel bars

Altogether these incidents would make it appear that Texas is inundated by a tidal wave of crime.

It is an unsavory reputation which Texas is acquiring over the whole world. The peace and dignity of the state so often has been outraged that Texas newspapers afford every evidence that the people have determined to do something about it.



Mosley's Resignation from Cabinet Is Blow to Britain's Labor Government.

LONDON. June 5 ...-.. Great Britin's highly vulnerable Labor Party has received one of its most serious blows from the most unexpected quarter-within its own ranks. And Sir Oswald Mosley, 33-year-old M. P., has taken the most sensational steps adopted by any ambitious politician in many a decade-he resigned his position in the Mac-Donald cabinet because, in his opinion, it was not doing enough for the workers and unemployed who form such a large part of the Labor party's vote.

Mosley was Chancellor of the Duchy of Lancaster, a post given him so he could assist J. H. Thomas, Lord Privy Seal, in tackling the ominous unemployment problem. But he wasn't permitted to tackle it hard enough, so quit his job in protest against the government's muddling methods.'

The young M. P. thinks Thomas and the MacDonald cabinet back of him have been too slow and too cautious in dealing with the labor situation. He has been for a movement that was startling in its extent and implications. He was willing to spend nearly a billion dollars to put great public works under construction. He wanted to raise the school age so that more children would be shut out of the factories, and to pension working peo-

ple over 60. In that way, by cutting out the young and providing for the old, jobs could be found for the younger men and women who now are out of employment.

Cabinet Opposes Him

But his proposals were turned down by the very cabinet to which he belonged. PARIS, June 6.- A journey to the oon is no longer a flight of fancy, least to Robert Esnault-Pelterie. brilliant young French scientist who is president of the Society of Savants and Inventors of France. 


