"In mentioning the British-United States debt settlement, I referred to the Lausanne gentleman's agreement and not to the Franco-British accord as everyone thought," Herriot said.

Without confirming that he had made a reported statement that Britain was unable to negotiate with the United States without consulting France, Herriot said that the gentlemen's agreement provided that the Lausanne accord was ineffective until all of Germany's creditors reached a satisfactory settlement with their own creditors.

and indispensable factor in the economic life of our state. They help in a large measure to pay the expense of our state, county
