UNITED STATES IN BUSINESS HAS INVESTED 27 PER CENT IN SHORT TIME OF WHAT RUSSIA EXPENDED

By MORRIS DE HAVEN TRACY, United Press Staff Correspondent. WASHINGTON. (UP)—The United States government has invested in American business, industry and agriculture or has available for such investment an aggregate sum equal to 27 per cent of the amount that Russia has put so far into its entire "five year plan".

The United States is second only to Russia among the nations when it comes to public investment in business, industry and agriculture. Figures compiled by the United Press show this country has already invested \$3,096,329,687.01 (B) in American business and has available a potential sum of \$4,568,135,314 (B). This has been made possible through the Reconstruction Finance corporation, the Farm Loan board and other agencies loaning to agriculture, the Homes Loans banks and smaller government enterprises. The total already invested or authorized for investment amounts to \$7,664,515,201.01 (B). One hears much about Russia and the five year plan, under which the government has taken over, developed and expanded Russia's industry and agriculture. The Soviet information bureau gives the total Russian investment in the five year plan at approximately \$27,500,000,000 (B).

BERLIN, August 1. (UP)—An unofficial report said that 26 were dead and more than 200 wounded in street fighting as returns arrived from yesterday's parliamentary elections in which Adolf Hitler's fascists fell far short of a majority.

AUSTIN, Aug. 1. (UP)—East Texas production of 44 barrels per well became effective today. R. D. Parker, chief of the oil and gas division of the railroad commission, estimated that there would be about 7,300 wells by August 15, and the reduction was made to keep with in the field limit of 325,000 barrels per day.

Texas Livestock Values Increase

Recent upturns in livestock prices have increased the value of Texas' 6,127,000 cattle nearly \$10,000,000 ago. There are 2,038,000 hogs more than \$4,000,000. It is estimated by John C. Burns, manager of the Texas Livestock Marketing Association of Fort Worth, cattle have shown an average increase of \$2.60 per head and hogs \$2 each.

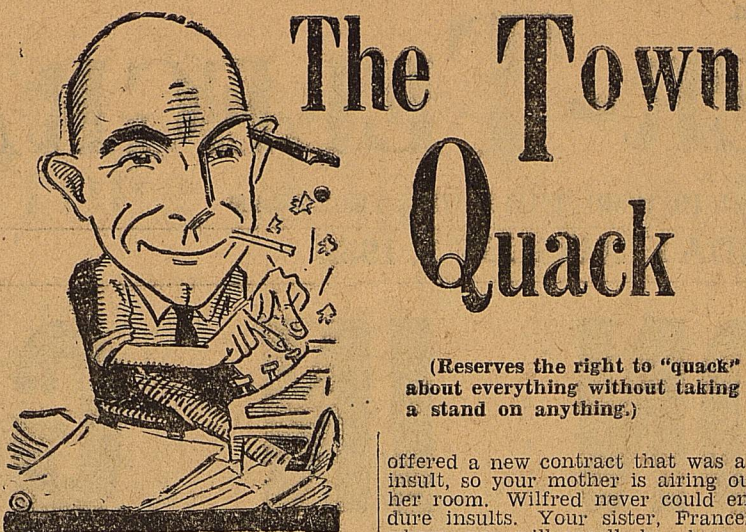

EDITORIAL NOTES

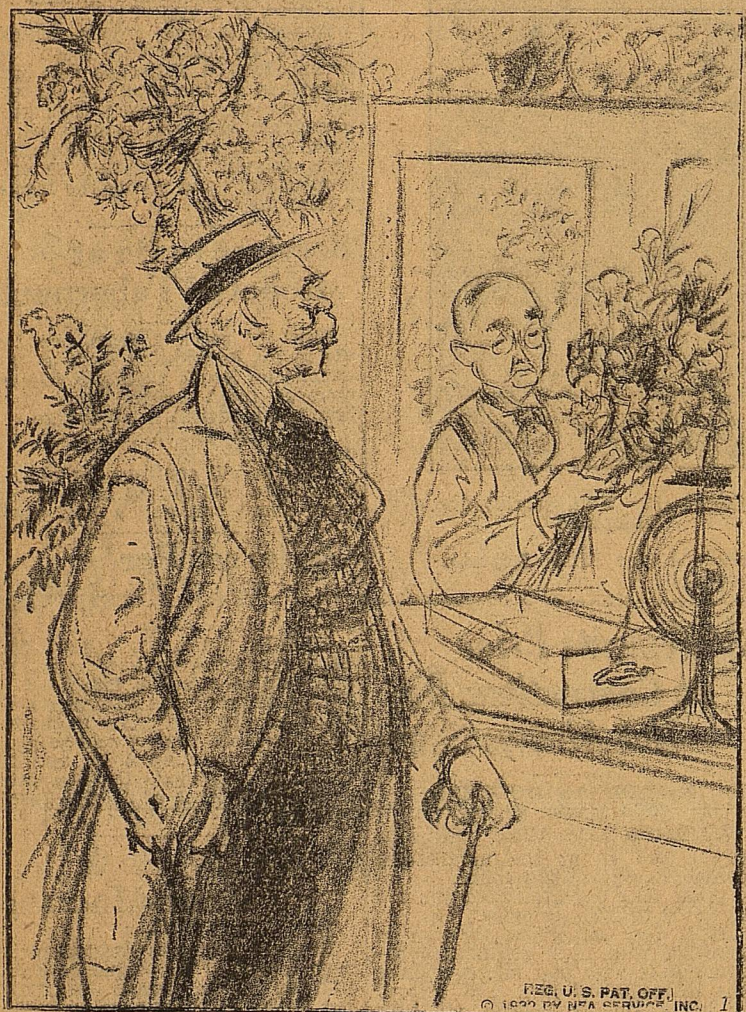
