# **EXHIBITS** AT TULSA VALUABLE

Midland Secretary Is Elated at Value Of Publicity

Centacts with supply or specialty companies exhibiting at the International Petroleum exposition a Tulsa formed one of the most important benefits to Midland, in the opinion of the Midland chamber of commerce secretary who returned home Sunday night from the oil

The Midland exhibit in what is held to be the best position in the exposition grounds could have been seen by the more than 100,000 people who attended, but even more important than the exhibit itself, the Midland representative declared, was the vast amount of publicity given the city through the technical magazines and newspapers.

The petroleum exposition was the biggest and best yet held. There were about 25 per cent more exhibitors and the attendance broke all records. The next exposition will be in May, 1932. Midland, San Angelo and Oklahoma City were the only cities to have exhibits, and San Angelo started two years after the idea was originated by R. M. Barron and carried through the chamber of commerce by him and Arthur

### BRADY IS ON RISE Midland Gets Rain

Of 1.31 Inches In 48 Hours

BRADY, Oct. 13. (A).— Brady, the exact center of Texas and many other Texas points were flooded today as the result of heavy rains.

The Santa Fe railroad station was under four feet of water at Christoval in the heaviest Concho river flood since 1906. Tourist camps and the Bapist encampment were damaged.

Three hundred feet of the Santa Fe track was reported washed out between Talpa and Valera. Ballinger reported a six-inch rain

and San Angelo two inches. Many persons who were forced from their homes by high water a week ago here were again driven out today. The Brady river was rising rapidly after a six-inch rain at Eden. Water was within a quarter block of the court house plaza. Last week's Brady flood caused damage of \$350,000

All Sections Wet DALLAS, Oct. 13. (A). - Lake

Wichita and Holiday creek at Wichita Falls were flooded the worst for 15 years, and the Wichita river was leaving its banks for the first time since construction of the Lake Kemp dam. #### ENTERPRISING SCHOOL STUDENTS

Results of observance of fire prevention week in Midland have been gratifying. Of principal note was the response shown by school students in entering whole-heartedly the contests for fire prevention posters and essays. These posters and essays evidenced a keen duty of fire prevention methods and causes of fire, showing that most of the students had studied fire prevention literature closely; but they also went farther than that. Some of the posters and essays brought out new ideas on fire prevention, which is primarily the purpose of such contests.

Midland, as has been said repeatedly in this paper, enjoys the maximum good fire record credit with the state fire insurance commission. With the study made by children of fire prevention, and with cooperation from adults, this little city should continue to keep fires down to the minimum.

As one of the essays said, "Fire prevention is something that should be practiced not only during fire prevention week but every day in the year.'

#### NO CAUSE FOR PESSIMISM

The latest industrial reports by no means justify the exaggerated pessimism that has been visible in some quarters, says the recent industrial survey of the Guaranty Trust company of New York City, one of the most con-servative and most painstaking of the nation's business analysts.

"Such a view," continues the survey, "is as incompatible with past experience and present facts as in the attitude of those who have consistently refused to face the truth that the world is in the midst of a genuine and severe business depression.

"Overdrawn and distorted views either give rise to unwarranted hopes and encourage false starts that can only end in further slumps, or dampen confidence and delay the return of prosperity.

'There is nothing abnormal or unprecedented about the present situation. It is a perfectly natural reaction, such as has been witnessed many times in the past and will continue to recur at intervals as long as our economic organization is what it is.

"The return of the next wave of prosperity is as inevitable and certain as was the termination of the last wave. Slowly but surely, the forces that will bring about revival are at work.

After considering the status of buying and selling among the principal commodities, many of which present signs of a healthy perking up, the survey optimistically

"In several directions, evidences have appeared that prices are considered at or near the bottom and that buyers are no longer deferring their commitments in the expectation of lower quotations.

"In the copper industry, several important consumers are reported to have placed large orders covering prospective requirements for several months in advance. A similar situation has been noted in the cotton textile industry, where trade had beeen partly paralyzed by the Akron. weakness of prices of raw maerial, with the prospect that an upward reaction will take place as soon as buyers be- cubic feet-far larger than the ill- peze arrangement. come persuaded that the lowest point has been reached.

"Large industrial consumers of wheat, sugar and other food products have recently availed themselves of the low prices to provide for their needs many months in advance.

The survey indicates that low prices are starting buying and thus places its fingers on the crux of the present economic problem.



Another of the conveniences of the modern kitchen is the hood of the stove, which is effective in drawing off kitchen odors. In order to purchase a hood, it is necessary to go to your local sheet metal worker, who will install it if the proper outlet is available.

The factors which should determine the kind of materials to be selected are ease of cleansing, and ease of working the material into shape. Price naturally is a factor, but if the hood will rust easily or if considerable effort is required to keep it clean, then the housewife will do better by paying a bit more for another

Hoods are made in copper, steel, enameled iron with nickelplated trimmings, and in nickel alloys. If ordering steel, it is advisable to have it painted to avoid rusting.



### BEST BOY'S ESSAY IN HIGH SCHOOL STRESSES DANGERS OF IMPROPER FLUES

The following essay, "Safe Flues and Chimneys," was voted the best fire prevention essay written in the high school by boys. The student received a \$5 prize. He is James Hawthorne and in the eighth grade.

Building chimneys with bricks laid on the edge is a popular practice in many parts of the country. This is one of the main reasons for defective chimney fires in rural sections. Sooner or later the mortar between the bricks will crack and sparks will fly through. Much destruction may thus be caused.

Bricks should always be laid flat and the entire chinney should be lined with fire clay. Chimneys should be built from the ground up and never placed on beams.

Flue holes that are not in use should not be covered with paper, for when stoves are set up this introduces conditions that may prove dangerous. Defective flues and chimneys were

esponsible for about \$26,500,115 in 1923 and 1927. This was about 14 1-2 per cent of the total loss from live n rural districts, which shows that chimneys and flues in rural districts are often ill constructed. Wooden shingles cause many fire

which might be avoided otherwise Sparks may fly from chimneys or bonfires and land on these shingles and cause great destruction Fires originating this way cause about eight per cent of the total rural fire loss. In five years time there was entered in the legers oss of \$17,392,963 from fires resultng from sparks on roofs.
