Turkeys for Thanksgiving and Christmas may even be cheaper this year than they were for the same Hotel Manager period last season, produce dealers say. Also, items that make up the trimmings may cost less.

Rescue Work Slowed By Blocking of Mine Mouth

BERLIN, Oct. 21. (A) - one hundred miners were known to be dead from an Alsdorf mine blast near here. It was thought at first that only 40 men had lost their lives.

BERLIN, October 21. (AP)--The Prussian trade ministry this afternoon announced 40 dead from an underground dynamite blast at Wilhelm shaft, Anna mine, near Alsdorf, Germany.

There were 400 men at work when the explosion happened, 300 of the number escaping. The other 100 were either dead, injured or missing. Twenty-two bodies had been recovered and many were believed to have been trapped.

The management said rescue work would be slow because the mine mouth had been blocked. Rescue work was progressing through a circuitous underground route to the shaft's Maria mine several miles

There was intense confusion as nundreds of relatives rushed to the mine and made the work of checkng casualties difficult. Cause of the explosion was not determined, but ignition of the explosion depot some 800 feet beneath the ground was given officially as the possible cause.

New Mexico Towns Threaten to Do Something About New Air Mail Line

United Press Aviation Editor.

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21. (UP). -Two small New Mexico towns, Lordsburg and Deming, threatened today to disrupt the entire government machinery resonsible for laving out the nation's airways-and all because they were not placed on the proposed new southern transcentinental airmail route.

Letters galore protesting the failure to include the two towns, both of which are less than 3,-300 population, have been pouring into the office of Assistant Commerce Secretary for Aeronautics Clarence M. Young. One, typical of the countless received, was from Gov. Dillon of New Mexico. The governor apparently was quite irked about the whole matter. New Mexico was being slighted, he believed.

New Mexico wrote Dillon in effect, continually sends republicans to the senate and house and yet when it comes times to choose cities over which an important transcontinental airway shall run, his state is left out and Arizona, a democratic stronghold is included. This assuredly was gross neglect if not downright favoritism, concluded the irate governor. Something must be done about it - and done pronto.

The provoked governor was soothed somewhat by a letter from the aeronautics branch pointing out that New Mexico already had two towns on the mid-continent airmail line, Tu-

whereas only the southern route served Texas.

In an interview with the United Press, Col. Young explained his position in the matter as well as that of the government. Disclaiming any responsibility

for leaving Lordsburgh and Deming off the airway, Young pointed out that decisions as to routes of airmail lines are made by the inter-departmental committee on aeronautics, in which his department has only one voice among four. Members of the committee are the secretaries of commerce, war, and navy and the postmaster general.

Young held it would be illogical to have the airway pass over

Lordsburgh and Deming for at least two reasons: first because of the expense-upwards of \$70,-000-to install radio guiding beacons to deviate from the "straight line" between El Paso. Tex., and Douglas, Ariz., and second, because the neither of two towns could provide enough airmail to make stops profitable.

There is a tremendous lesson in this great movie.

LEARNING TO LEAD BOYS

Would you, as a man, be satisfied to have a boy, your own boy for instance, follow you all through the routine of your day's work, hear every statement you make and see everything you do? Of course there are plenty of men who could do that with all safety to the boy, but, on the other hand, many a comparatively good man suffers those lapses of conduct in which he would prefer not to have boys, especially his boy, around.

This conduct is sometimes noticeable on the golf course. Men who do very little swearing sometimes give vent to oaths when playing golf, and the caddy is usually there to hear it. Other men who swear habitually have learned to control their speech in the presence of boys.


ONE-ROOM SCHOOLS





Secretaryship of the Interior Seems to Be a Jinx Job-Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur Is Finding It Hard Going and Some Say He Would Be Happy to Return to Leland Stanford,

WASHINGTON, Oct. 21 .- No oth- | er member of the Hoover cabinet has had anywhere near as hard going as Dr. Ray Lyman Wilbur, who took a leave of absence from the presidency of Leland Stanford University to become secretary of the interior.

Considering the auspicious cirumstances under which Wilbur entered political life, it all seems rather remarkable. A year and a half ago he was generally regarded as an idealist and a liberal of great ability and intellectual, attainment. Consultation of the files confirms the impression that his was about the only cabinet appointment which was not attacked from one quarter or another. Many persons thought it was the best appointment of the lot. Wilbur was the cabinet's on "Hoover man." He had gone to col lege with the president and they were very close friends alway thereafter. No one ever doubted tha the Interior Department

But now it must be admitted that Dr. Wilbur, who is a trusted adviser has had to watch Mr. Hoover de cline in popularity, is himself rated not much higher than his brother Curtis, who was secretary of the navy. Everyone in Washington has heard the story that Coolidge appointed Curtis under the impression that he was selecting Ray. Whether that was true or not it was always rather a mistake, even if not exactly that kind of a mistake.

May Cancel Leave

It often takes a man a long time to gain credit for successful accomplishment of a constructive program whereas it takes no time at all to get into hot water. But Dr. Wilbur may be unable to stay and rear glory. The Stanford Daily at Pale Alto, student publication, says his leave of absence from Stanford has expired, that the trustees will refuse it and that Dr. Wilbur will have to return to his old job or resign.

That seems like a blow from be hind in view of Dr. Wilbur's other troubles. It might prevent him from remaining in Washington to explain why he happened to take it upor himself to change the name of Boul der Dame to Hoover Dam, as he die the other day while pounding silver spike into a railroad tie.

When appropriations are asked for 'Hoover Dam" the Senate is likely to ask what it's all about. The Sen ate killed off a resolution last January, introduced by Senator Smoot which would have changed the name to "Hoover Dam" after Senator Harrison and Norris had greeted the bill with sarcastic comment.


