Three weeks ago Odessa was practically unknown outside of a small circle. Today news of Odessa has been published in practically every large city in the United States. Last Sunday the Star-Telegram and Dalsa and the proposed oil activity for this section.

The next issue of the Petroleum monthly publication will carry an article on Odessa, as will next Sunday's editions of the New York Morning Telegraph and the Boston Telegram.

All the stories told of the potential possibilities of Odessa and surrounding country, first as a cattle country and second as an oil country.

Already the results are seen in the comment that the articles are occasioning and in the mail which the Odessa club is receiving. It is bound to help Odessa and create wide interest in this community.

The Odessa club will this week complete a map of this section, the most complete and elaborte ever made of this district. The map was made at considerable expense and will be distributed free as soon as it is off the press. It shows a large section of Midland County.

The Odessa club last week presented a registered Jersey cow to the Star-Telegram Milk and Ice Fund. Since the announcement was made, the Star-Telegram has been carrying daily stories of the event and Odessa has managed to monopolize the spot-light as far as West Texas is concerned.

On June 23rd a delegation from the booster committee will go to Fort Worth and will present the cow personally to Col. Louis Wortham, editor of the Star-Telegram. The presentation speech will be made by Judge J. T. Cross, of Odessa, The cow is from the herd of J. M. Gist, of Odessa, who has patriotically presented it to the Odessa club. Mr. Gist will also attend the presentation.

W. R. Rhodes, a member of the executive committee of the Commercial club, is giving a barbecue to 200 citizens from Odessa and Midland Saturday in the interests of the club. It is hoped to show the objects of the club and to urge the co-operation of Midland citizens, in an effort to

It is currently reported that a half-million dollar corporation will soon be organized in Amarillo, to develop potash fields in Teaxs. The operations will be led by two wellknown Texans. Col. Will A. Miller, Jr., of Amarillo, and Dr. Charles W. Dabney, of Houston. Col. Miller will have charge of finances and the field work, while Dr. Dabney is to be at the head of the analytical and chemical end of the development, he having spent a number of years in Germany in connection with the potash works of that country. This corporation is soon to enter

with a series of tests in the Midland county field, and already it has secured control of 200 sections, on which some interesting finds have been made. At this time a representative of the interests in the east is buying special machinery for the tests. For the tests, it is necessary to use core drills, and these are being

So far as practicable the drilling has been followed by this co-operative representative, who has made rough field tests of drill cuttings and brines in a search for evidence that the drill had struck beds of salts rich in potash and has sent samples that appeared to deserve thorough chemical analysis to the chemical laboratories of the co-operating bureaus. The problem of re-organizing the presence of a thin bed of potash salt, of determining its thickness, and of identifying its precise position in the stratigraphic column is rather difficult, however, on account of the adverse conditions of observation, the methods of drilling, and sometime the indifference of the driller. Among the samples recently examined by D. D. Christner, the present co-operative representative at Amarillo, as one from the Bryant well in Midland County, Texas, which as shown by a rough field test, is very rich in potash. Subsequent accurate determination in the laboratories of the State University and of the Geological Survey in Washington showed that this sample, which was saved by the driller from cuttings taken at depths between 2,405 and 2,525 feet, contained about 9 per cent of potash (K20.) 
