





### SCOUTMASTER MURPHY SAYS THOSE WHO ATTEND THE SCOUTMASTERSHIP SCHOOL HERE WILL BE BENEFITTED

The training school in the elements of scoutmastership which will begin in Midland on Thursday evening, Oct. 23, is for three groups of men, according to the Rev. Thomas D. Murphy, who will serve as scoutmaster of the course.

"For the man who is interested in his own boy, the one who is interested in his neighbor's boys, this course will give you a better insight into boy nature and will help you in every way to be a better pal to the boys of Midland. If you are interested in the boy life of your own town and the future men of Midland you cannot afford to avail yourself of the opportunity to offered by the local scout officials in putting on this school," Scoutmaster Murphy said.

"The course will be a continuation of the one given last year in that it will take up where the course left off and will carry you through the first class work and into the merit badge program. There will be no long cut and dried talks. You will learn by doing as the scouts do. Everything will be taught by the play method, and the games and methods used are a sure cure for the blues. Leave your troubles and cares at home and meet with us next Thursday evening at seven-thirty. You will be dismissed by nine-twenty each evening.

"There will be two outdoor sessions, one afternoon hike with one meal in camp and an overnight hike with two meals in camp. Those who completed the course last year and finish this course will be given an approved certificate, while those who did not take the work last year but complete this year's work will be given a minimum certificate."

### WTCC Has Neat \$112,981 Balance

ABILENE, Oct. 18. (AP).—The West Texas chamber of commerce, after a year "in the red" financially, is now back on its feet, and with a neat balance of \$112,981.65 cash, is launching into a rapidly expanding program for the future, following a meeting of the executive board recently at Sweetwater, when tentative dates for the 1931 general convention at Lubbock were fixed as May 14, 15 and 16.

The treasurer's report, filled at the meeting, revealed that D. A. Bandeen, formerly of El Paso, now manager of the organization, had led the regional chamber from a \$23,000 debt into the favorable balance during his first year.

Among steps taken by the executive board was the creation of a new traffic setup, to be handled by the traffic managers at El Paso, Wichita Falls, Amarillo and San Angelo. This board will assist communities having traffic problems, without charge, and when sustained work is required, one of its members will be employed on part time basis. Formerly all traffic matters were handled out of San Antonio, Fort Worth or Dallas.

Creation of an all-West Texas board to promote the development of a museum at San Angelo also was approved; appointment of the board to be made by President Charles E. Coombes. Present plans are to acquire the old buildings at Fort Concho.

Endorsement of the proposed constitutional amendment for taxing university lands was voted, along with a pledge of active assistance. Miss Harrison, and Troop Bugler Fred Middleton.

Tests were checked and roll was called. The troop then practiced on events which will be in the inter-

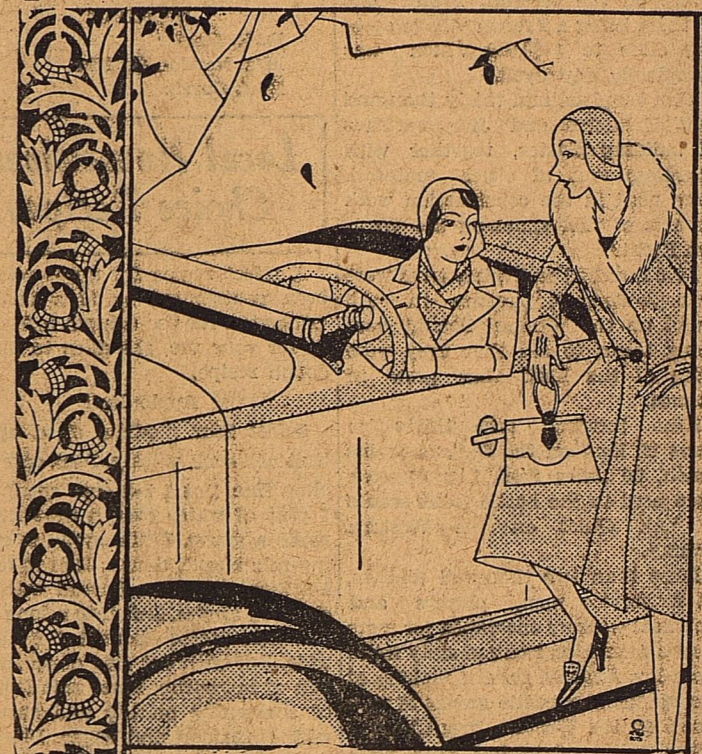
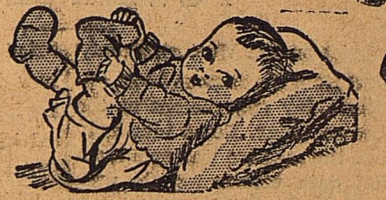

MASSIVE FILM PRODUCTION POWERFUL HUMAN STORY

"All Quiet on the Western Front," pictured from the famous book, opens a three-day engagement at the Ritz theatre today. Some idea may be had of the massive war epic from the brief data concerning its production activities. This all talking picture is hailed as one of the outstanding productions of all time. Six tons of dynamite, 20,000 pounds of black powder and six thousand bombs were used to give the effect of shell fire and mine explosions in "All Quiet on the Western Front." A French village costing close to \$100,000 was blown to splinters and dust for one scene alone in "All Quiet on the Western Front." Real shells from real guns were fired to give the sound effect of shells whistling through the air in the battle and bombardment scenes of "All Quiet on the Western Front." More than 2,000 ex-service men who were under fire overseas were used in the various battle scenes of "All Quiet on the Western Front," preference always being given to American Legion men. The largest outdoor set ever built at Universal City was constructed for "All Quiet on the Western Front," the set being the exterior of a famous German barracks where the 1914 recruits were trained. A canal a quarter of a mile in length, thirty feet in width and fifteen feet in depth was dug for but one episode of "All Quiet on the Western Front." Twelve flame throwers actually used in France were used in one of the spectacular battle scenes of "All Quiet on the Western Front." A street car running of its own power was especially built for but two scenes in a German village in 1914 in "All Quiet on the Western Front." Twenty German howitzers, cap-

tured by the American army and now trophies at various American Legion posts, were loaned to Universal by Legionnaires for use in "All Quiet on the Western Front." Thirty-five different settings were built at a cost of \$498,000 for "All Quiet on the Western Front," one of them being a French village costing close to \$100,000 which was completely destroyed. Five hundred and thirty thousand feet of lumber and five carloads of building plaster, together with countless tons of other material, were used in the construction work on sets of "All Quiet on the Western Front." Five hundred and thirty trees were transplanted for scenes in "All Quiet on the Western Front," care being taken to see that they were trees of the kind that grew in France. Nine hundred and thirty-five acres of land on the famous Irvine ranch, 60 miles from Los Angeles, were used in the battle front scenes of "All Quiet on the Western Front." More than two thousand soldiers, all ex-service men, players and technical workers encamped for more than a month on location sixty miles from Los Angeles, for the making of the spectacular battle scenes of "All Quiet on the Western Front." Ten miles of barbed wire were strung on the battlefield for "All Quiet on the Western Front," which covered close to 1,000 acres and which was regarded as the most realistic ever reproduced. American, French, German, British and Italian war veterans, with a few Russians of the royalist type, made up the picturesque army of soldiers in "All Quiet on the Western Front," probably the most colorful assemblage of fighting men massed since the great war.

Local Housewives' Choice Recipes

A select recipe for apple roll has been contributed by Mrs. Carl W. Covington for the column today. Also for your use, she adds to biscuit dough recipe.

Apple Roll
Select four medium sized apples that will cook quickly. Peel, core and chop fine. Put 1 1-2 cups sugar and 1 pint of water over a slow fire to make a syrup. While syrup is cooking mix biscuit dough. Roll to about 1-4 inch thickness. Spread with the chopped apples. Roll into a long roll. Cut into pieces about 1 1-2 inches wide. Put with cut side down in the pan of hot syrup. Place small pieces of shortening on top and sprinkle with cinnamon and sugar. Place in the oven and bake until apples are cooked and the crust a golden brown. May be served with whipped cream.

Biscuit Dough
2 cups flour
1-2 teaspoon salt
2 tablespoons sugar
4 teaspoon baking powder
4 tablespoon shortening
3-4 cup milk.
