


It seems that Gene invited Mary to tea when he heard of her return engagement in Amarillo, at which time they will discuss the editorial criticism she received in his paper on her previous appearance. He invited 40 leading Amarillo men to dinner when he entertains her, stipulating that they must wear frock tail coats. Bruce Catton, who writes for the NEA feature service, got a big kick out of failure to find the coats in Texas. Here is a part of his comment:

"But-frock coats in Texas? The 40 guests searched their wardrobes. No frock coats. They sped downtown to the clothing stores. Not a frock coat was to be had. The Panhandle has never found much use for them, and the clothiers simply hadn't stocked them. So, in the end, (the 40 Texans had to wire to effete Chicago and have their frock coats sent down special delivery.

"All of this, very likely, is relatively unimportant in a day of great issues and knotty problems. 
