NO LIVES ARE LOST IN DAM BREAK

Third Woman Victim of Road House Shooting Is Dead

SAWED-OFF SHOT GUNS WERE USED

Novice Bandits Fired Broadside When Dark Fell

CHICAGO, Nov. 24. (UP)—The third woman victim died today from bullet wounds received during a roadhouse robbery in which eight nervous bandits fired several shots from sawed-off shotguns into a group of merry-makers. After killing three and wounding two, the bandits escaped with \$200.

Barbara Lee, 22, and Alice Ward, 29, entertainers, were killed instantly. Mary Sancy, 36, beauty shop operator, died today. John Gates, waiter, and James Mikus, railroad policeman, were seriously injured.

POLITICAL MAP PUZZLING; SOLONS ELECT AT LARGE?

AUSTIN, Nov. 24. (UP)—Maps of the Texas congressional districts, as shown in the Congressional Directories of 1910 and 1930 graphically depict the task that will confront the Texas Legislature next January when it takes up redistricting to fit in the three new Texas Congressmen allowed by the new census.

Jig-saw puzzles must have originated from congressional district maps.

In 1911 an unsuccessful attempt was made to redistrict Texas. Later this was done to make places for two additional Congressmen allowed. This year's task will be more difficult. Three must be accommodated.

On the theory that a division of population entitles each section of 280,000 population to a Congressman, Dallas, Bexar and Harris counties each might claim a Congressman with a one-county district. Representative Ray Holder of Lancaster insists that Dallas County is really entitled to a Congressman for itself alone.

The First, Second, Third and Fourth Texas Districts have escaped any change in redistricting since 1910.

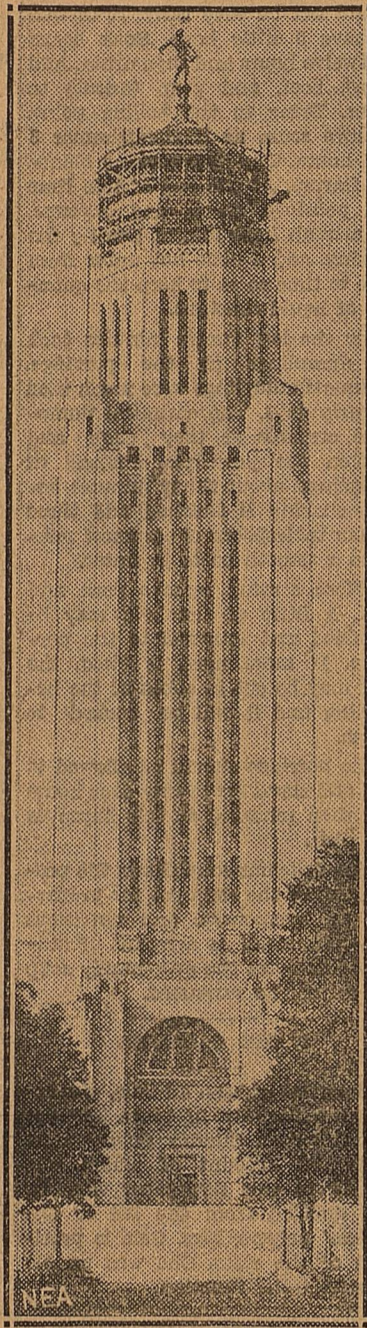
Big changes of former redistricting began with the thirteenth District. This area, which now embraces only Archer, Baylor, Clay, Cooke, Denton, Jack, Montague, Throckmorton, Wichita, Wilbarger, Wise and Young Counties, prior to redistricting took in those same counties and had beside all of the Texas Panhandle.

The old Fourteenth, which the last redistricting inadvertently changed into a Republican district, consisted of Bexar, Blanco, Coma and Kendall of the present Fourteenth, but the strong Republican Guadalupe County vote was then polled in the fifteenth district, and the Republican strength of Bexar, Kendall, Blanco and Coma smothered by inclusion with Brown, Burnett, Coleman, Lampasas, Llano, McCulloch, Mason, Mills and San Saba Counties. These were enough to keep it nominally Democratic, even though the comparatively strong Republican vote of Gillespie and Kerr Counties was also in the district.

The fifteenth District, balivick and stronghold of Congressman John Garner, Democratic house leader, has remained practically undisturbed. The old district had 25 counties. The new one has 23. In the last redistricting it lost Bandera, Terrell and Val Verde to the Seventeenth, and Bee, Guadalupe, Nueces, San Patricio and Wilson to the Fourteenth. At the same time it received Brooks, Jim Hogg, Jim Wells, Kenedy, Kleburg and Willacy Counties. The Sixteenth in extreme West Texas had little change.

If redistricting is not accomplished by the Legislature, the state will have three Congressmen-at-Large until it is redistricted. The Governor's election proclamation will merely call for election of the Congressmen in present districts and in addition three to be voted for by all parts of the state. Michael Filosa, 28, stabbed to death Silvano de Hall, 16, his step-brother, and dangerously slashed his stepsister, Catherine, 14, and his mother, Mrs. Anna de Hall, 49, while apparently still asleep.

YOUTH TO FACE SECOND TRIAL IN TEXARKANA

TEXARKANA, Texas, Nov. 24. (AP)—Lester Cooper, 21, will go on trial for his life for the second time Tuesday in Bowie county district court at Boston on a charge of murder of Paul Hunter 23, his roommate, at Texarkana April 27.

Cooper has been at liberty under \$10,000 bond since a jury failed to agree in his first trial in June. District Attorney R. G. Waters has made no announcement but is expected to demand the extreme penalty as in Cooper's first trial.

The defense will plead temporary insanity, coupled with hereditary insanity, emphasizing that liquor had rendered Cooper unable to realize what he was doing the night he shot his friend of several years to death in a Texarkana undertaking establishment.

Cooper's first trial drew one of the largest crowds in the history of Bowie county criminal procedure. The highlight was reached when Cooper, son of a former sheriff of Titus County, took the stand with tears in his eyes to tell the jury "I wouldn't have shot Paul Hunter for anything in the world; my mind was blank at the time."

Cooper said he had been drinking on the fatal day and got into a scuffle with Hunter in the embalming room of the undertaking establishment where both were employed. During the first trial the state presented only four witnesses. Cornish Malone, another employe of the undertaking establishment, told of hearing the argument between Cooper and Hunter but failed to see the fatal shots fired. Dr. Decker Smith testified Hunter was shot in the back twice.

After deliberating 24 hours the jury in the first trial reported itself hopelessly deadlocked. The jurors announced that all were in favor of conviction but that two had stood out for a suspended sentence. A special venire of 100 men has been summoned for the trial, which Judge George Johnson expects to be concluded within two days in order that court can be adjourned for Thanksgiving.

Think Wet Party To Be in Power

HOUSTON, Nov. 24. (UP)—An appeal to the democratic party to adopt a wet plan and accept prohibition as the major issue of 1932 and thereby elect the next president and have a majority in both houses of congress, was issued today by Frank Putnam of Houston, defeated repeal candidate for governor in the democratic primary.

JUNIOR RECORD SEEKER SPENDS NIGHT IN CITY

EL PASO, Nov. 24. (UP)—Gerald Nettleton left today for Tucson, en route to San Diego in quest of a new junior transcontinental flight record. He flew here from Midland this morning.

Here Last Night

Gerald Nettleton, 22-year-old flier in quest of a new junior transcontinental record, took off at 7:30 this morning from Sloan field on the first of four flight legs to San Diego.

He expected to reach the California city by 5 o'clock this afternoon, but said he would have to face his Warner-Monocoup slightly less than 115 miles an hour in order to do so.

Nettleton spent the night at Hotel Scharbauer. He was tired from bucking headwinds that forced him to turn far south from the course he had intended taking, he said. Rested this morning, he expressed confidence in being able to beat the Newark to San Diego record of 24 hours and 3 minutes held by Stanley Boynton.

"The motor of the plane has not missed a beat since taking off at Newark," the taciturn, dark-skin boy said.

The Warner motor gives the little craft 50 horsepower more than other Monocoups seen here. It is an exceptionally fast machine for its displacement and reaches a top speed of well over 120 miles an hour.

Nettleton landed at Sloan field at 3:50 Sunday afternoon. His flying time from Newark to Midland was given as 16 hours and 7 minutes.

His real reason for turning south was because of reported headwinds over mountains near Albuquerque, he said. He was tied up, he said, at Harrisburg, Columbus and Tulsa. He stopped Sunday at Sweetwater for a brief time.

Telegrams from various newspapers and press services of the country were received by The Reporter on the flier.

Ambassador Finds Praise for Methods

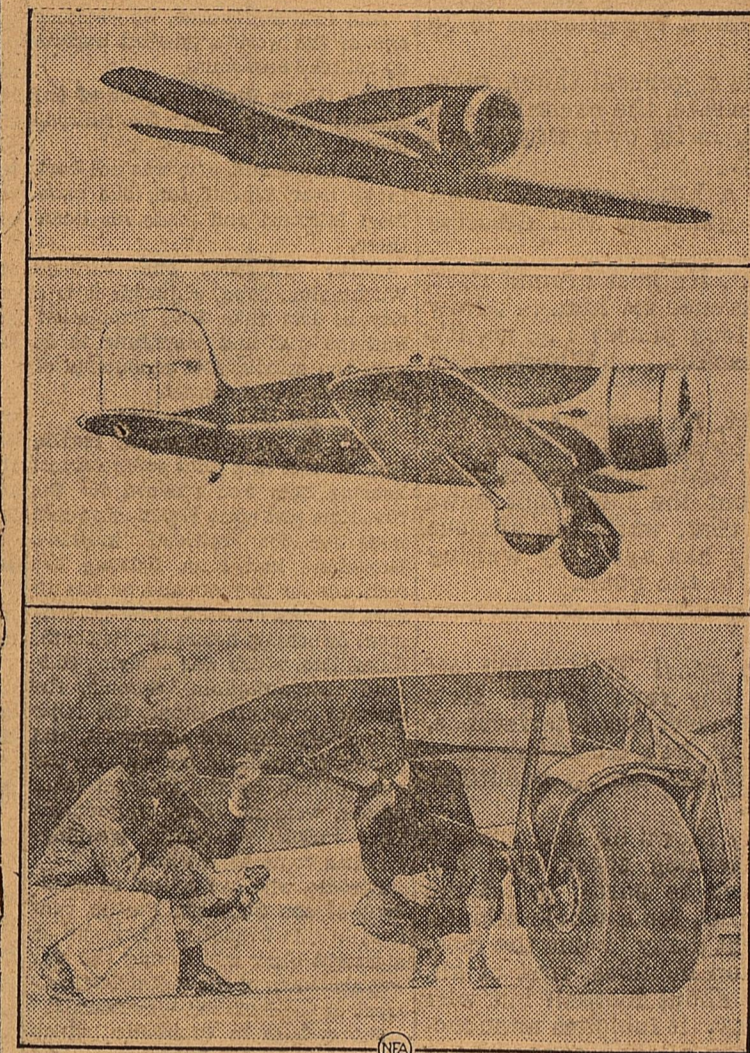

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24. (AP)—The supreme court today ruled that a husband and wife may file separate income tax returns in the states of Texas, Arizona, Louisiana and Washington. The government had claimed that the husband alone must file returns for both.

NO INCREASE IN TAX REDUCTION SEEN BY SNELL

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24. (AP)—Prediction that the one per cent tax reduction would not be increased this year, was made today by Chairman Snell of the house rules committee. He also declared an increase possible "if we are to meet all the present demands on the treasury."

WASHINGTON, Nov. 24. (AP)—Chairman Snell of the house rules committee said today "if the country is going to experiment with government operation power projects, I know no better place to try it than on Muscle Shoals."

Formerly opposed to government operation, Snell explained that he believed a majority of people favored federal operation of the gigantic Alabama project.

Vacancy Definition May Stop Suits

SAN ANGELO, Texas, Nov. 24. (AP)—The battle of billions on the western front of Texas may shift from the district and federal courts where dockets have been clogged with suits on oil lands to the halls of the Texas legislature at Austin. A bill probably will be presented to the next session defining the mechanics of determining excess school lands. This is a matter that has not been decided with any unanimity by the courts.

Since oil was discovered in West Texas and in the Panhandle there has been a plethora of vacancy suits. Vacancy hunters have thrived, oil companies and land owners have suffered until the West Texas definition of a vacancy is "a small strip of land producing oil." The legislature, attorneys here say, can direct the attorney general and the land commissioner to determine the excess lands and thus bring an end to litigation.

Coastal Earthquake Is Blamed for the Dam Going

MATHIS, Texas, Nov. 24. (AP)—Ranchers along the Nueces river today saw the flood subside after yesterday's break in a recently completed dam near here. They reported no one drowned, damage slight and livestock not endangered.

Damage Not Great

CORPUS CHRISTI, Nov. 24. (UP)—After inspection of a large area, authorities today announced no lives lost and property damage less than was first thought. Nearly all water was out of the lake today.

The Nueces river had receded enough to allow residents to return to most places.

S. F. Freese, Fort Worth, one of the consulting engineers in the construction, blamed undermining for the break, saying that a leak of adequate foundations caused it.

Earthquake Blamed

FORT WORTH, Nov. 24. (UP)—A coastal earthquake three weeks ago may have started trouble, causing the break of the Lovenskiold dam above Corpus Christi, Major J. B. Hawley, head engineer of the firm, said today. He said the dam was constructed brutally strong and that engineers and the city were criticized for the expensive way it was built.

Ross Asks People To Break Depression

HOUSTON, Nov. 24.—If all Texas people would start patronizing Texas industry and using Texas products, complaints of unemployment and business depression in this state would soon be lost and forgotten in the hum of Texas industry.

So declares Ross S. Sterling, governor-elect, who is making a study of the economic situation in Texas, in an effort to help improve it. The undertaking is in line with his campaign platform pledge of a business-like and progressive administration of state affairs.

14 to Be Tried in Travis County

DALLAS, Nov. 24. (AP)—Four remaining prisoners of 15 indicted in the burning of the Grayson county courthouse at Sherman, May 9, were released on their own recognizance today. The other ten had previously made bond. All await trial in Travis county, December first.

HOUSTON, Nov. 24. (AP)—Malcolm Owens, 30, and his estranged wife, were seriously shot here today at her home. Owens told an officer he fired at the woman with a shotgun and then turned the gun on himself.

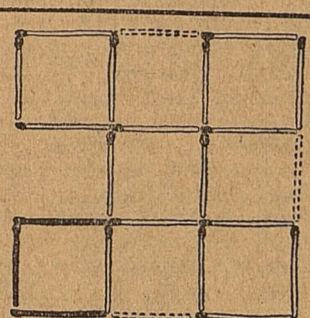

land was a few steps down the road, Jones suddenly jerked a pistol from a pocket and opened fire on him, one bullet striking him in the arm, McFarland said.

Arrested and charged with assault with intent to kill, young Jones declined to testify and was held for the grand jury which meets early in December.

Immediately, the entire community became an armed camp again and threats of McFarlands against Joneses, and Joneses against McFarlands, were rumored throughout the river section. Eventually J. G. Jones, father of Herbert, appeared in court in Texarkana and asked to have Jeff McFarland placed under peace bond because McFarland had threatened his life.

Scores of witnesses were brought into court by each faction, supposedly to testify of threats made by their enemies. But as each witness was called, he denied that he had heard of any death threats, meanwhile glaring at members of the rival faction seated in the courtroom.

Judge Louis Joseph terminated the hearing by threatening J. G. Jones with 60 days in jail for contempt of court. Turning to McFarland, Judge Joseph warned him that he could never expect peace as long as he lived in the community.

"If you stay there you will be killed or will have to kill someone in defense of your own life. I would advise you to take your family and move," the judge told McFarland.

McFarland replied that he would leave the community as soon as he could "attend to some business affairs."

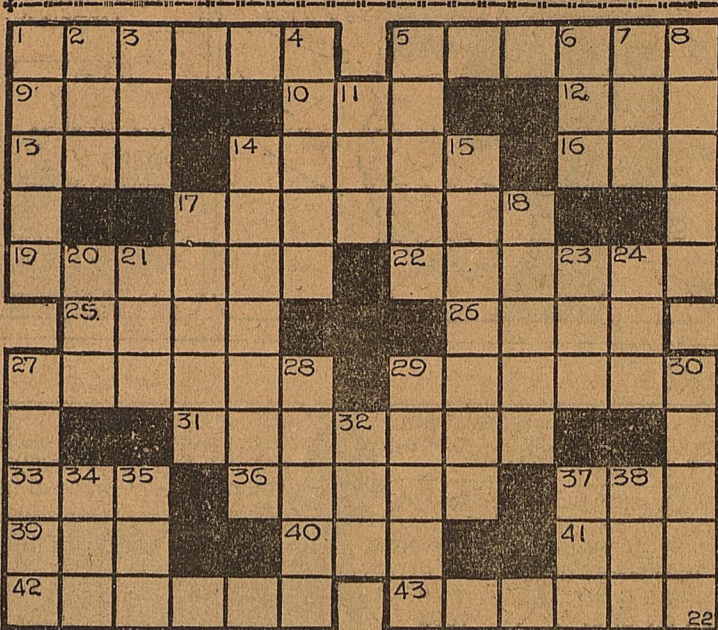

PUBLIC WORKS PROGRAM TO AID 300,000 JOBLESS

47,000 SEATS ARE AVAILABLE FOR A GREAT GRID CROWD

COLLEGE STATION, Texas, Nov. 24.—All told, a total of 47,000 seats will be available for the Texas Aggies-Texas Longhorn Thanksgiving day football game at Austin, James Sullivan, business manager of athletics, A. & M. college of Texas, said here following return from Austin and conference with Ed Olle, business manager of athletics at the University of Texas. A block of 5,400 seats is being erected at the south end of the Texas memorial stadium especially for the game, Sullivan said.

Assurance that the gridiron at Austin will be dry for the game despite weather conditions has been given in the announcement that the huge A. & M. gridiron cover will be sent to Austin for use as protection against rain. The cover is to be placed on the field at Austin this week-end.

Attendance at the Aggie-Longhorn game in Austin in 1928 totalled around 42,000, the record for a Southwest Conference game. As mentioned, the officials are prepared to take care of an even larger crowd this year. Pasteborders for the game are \$3.

No Real Cause for Business Concern

HOUSTON, Texas, Nov. 24. (P)—Returning from a visit to New York and other eastern cities, Jesse J. Jones, Houston capitalist, declared there is "no real cause for concern in Texas."

"We have been going at a very rapid pace ever since the World war and there is, of course, a saturation point in the consumption of goods and things beyond which we cannot go. But there is nothing really wrong with our country, if people will go along in a normal way, earning and spending money in a normal way."

"In comparing Texas with other sections of the United States, we are much better off because of our natural resources, our timber, oil, minerals, and, of course, our principal money crop, cotton," he explained.

"While I certainly do not wish to indicate that times are as good as they have been or that there will be an early return to business conditions that prevailed a year or so ago, I am firmly of the opinion that we have no real cause for concern in Texas."

Most observers of business agree that the recession in trade is at, or near the bottom, but many are wondering when the pendulum is going to start up again and what is going to start it. There must be some first impetus which will set in motion the cycle of recovery.

Perhaps that impetus was devised last election day when votes in many communities the country over approved bond issues, aggregating nearly \$500,000,000. This money will be used for public improvements. The first and most important immediate results will be to give unemployment relief.

A return of something resembling more normal purchasing power for 300,000 or 400,000 persons now out of work is promised by the bond issues and by other forms of jobless relief. This cannot fail to have a stimulating effect upon trade. It may provide just the push needed to speed up the slowed wheels of commerce.

Normally about \$3,500,000,000 is expended every year of public works, or one-third of the country's total construction. Thus public works constitute an economic wheel of great importance. Its usual volume will be increased in 1931 by the recent bond issues.

The improvements approved include roads, hospitals, park improvements, bridges and public buildings of all kinds. Some increase in taxes will result, but this would appear to be justified by the end in view.

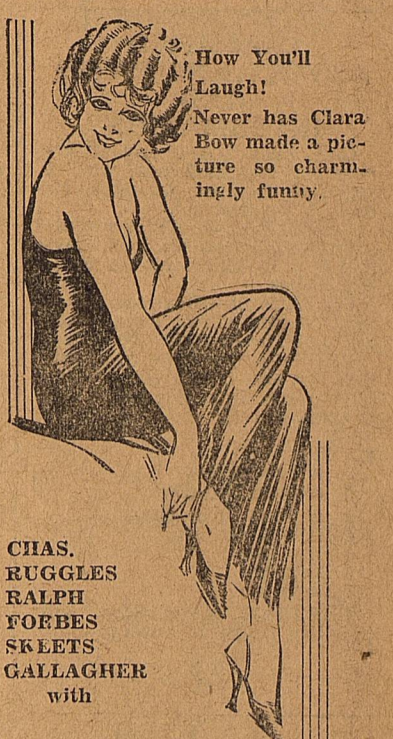
