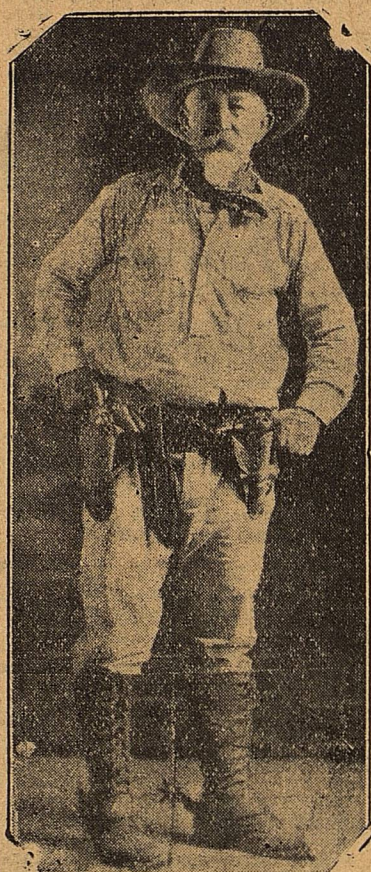

Captain Jim Cook, Warrior Of Indian Times, To Speak

Captain Jim Cook, veteran Indian fighter who roamed over West Texas while held captive by the Comanche Indians in Midland and will speak tonight between 7 and 8 o'clock on the court house lawn.

Boy scouts are especially invited. Captain Cook spoke to the Lions club Wednesday. He had just come from Big Spring where he addressed the Lions club, spoke at the annual picnic of the old settlers and addressed the boy scouts in a public meeting.

One morning his horses turned up missing. Cook tracked them to a big sink where Indians had left them while going after other herds. Being thirsty, he dismounted, and quaffed from the clear waters of the fork running into the sink.

While the Indians were killing the sheep, he was near a little lake north of where Midland now stands. Off in the distance they saw what they had feared—four Comanches searching for their sheep.

She wanted to go away with him. So together they slipped out one evening about dusk and headed for the white man's country. All night they rode and at noon the next day he and his wife pulled up to let their horses rest. It was near a little lake north of where Midland now stands.

For four years the two lived happily on their ranch, but then his Indian wife was destined to go. She was bitten by a rattlesnake and died shortly after. Thus ended Cook's first romance.

It was later that he married again, but he does not discuss that wedding. He does, however, have a picture of his second wife, a white woman. Too, he has a picture of his daughter.

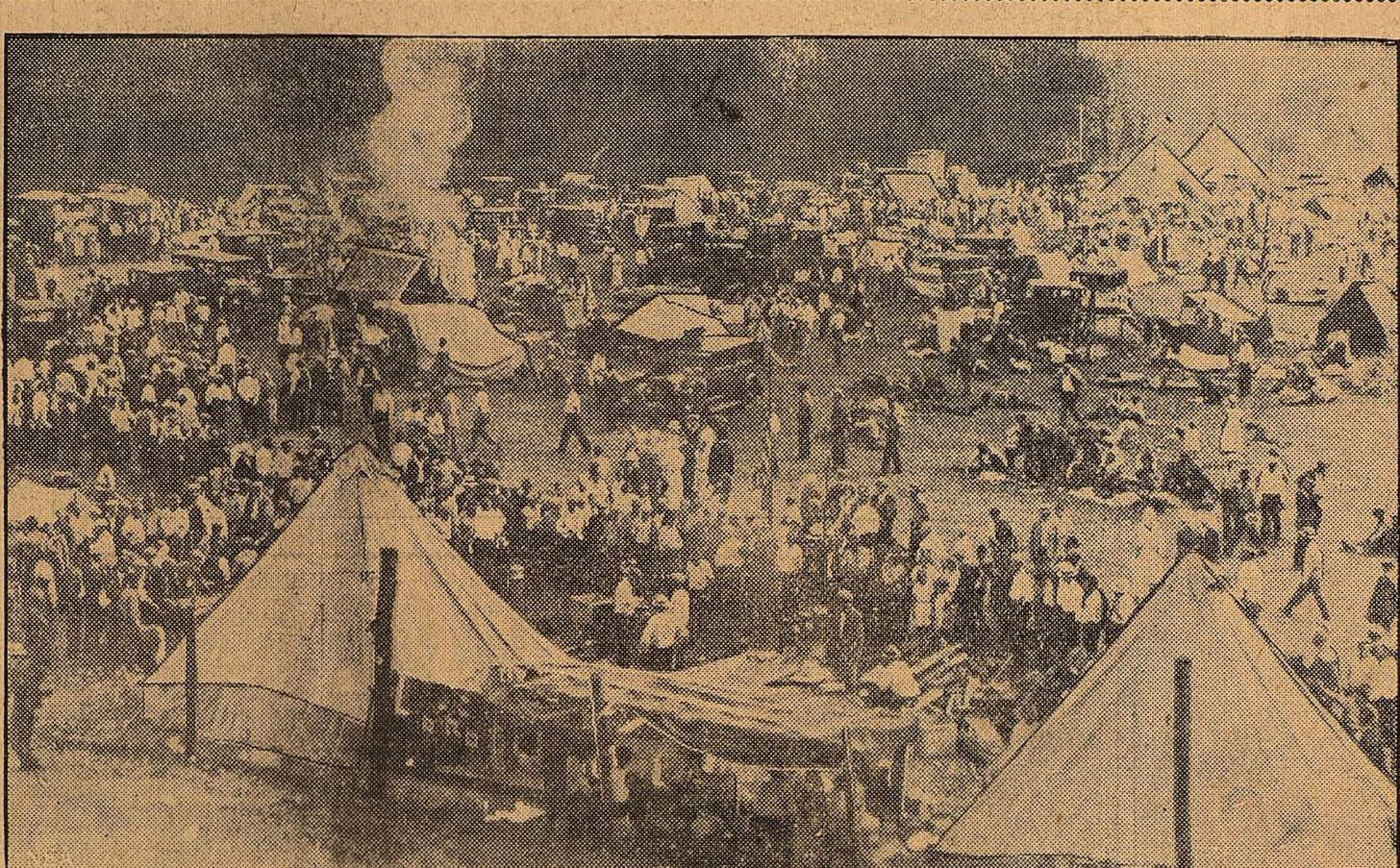
Both Countries Rush Mobilization

(UP)—It will take one half of one per cent of the entire national income to pay the government four per cent interest on the \$7,964,515,261.01 it has invested or has potentially available for investment in American business.

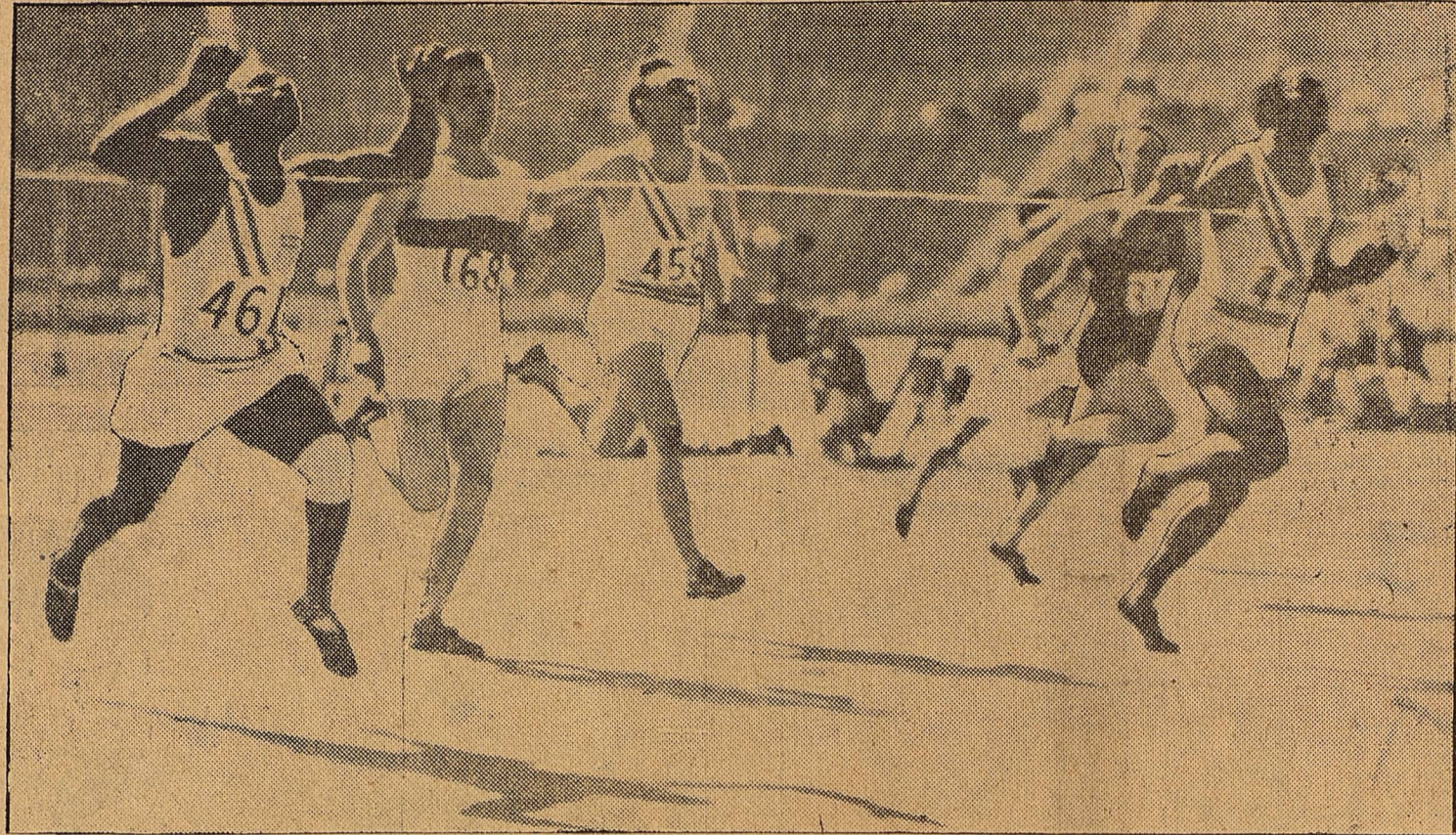
That means five cents of every \$10 received by every man, woman, child, business or corporation in the United States, will go for interest to the new silent partner in American enterprise. Out of every \$2,500 income, \$12.50 will go for such interest payments.

The citizen probably never will realize this for the payment will not be made in taxes. The government, through loans to agriculture, to business through the Reconstruction Finance corporation, and through other channels, has taken its interest in business as a lender of money, not as a stockholder. But the interest has to be paid, and is paid indirectly out of the national income—just as interest is paid to J. P. Morgan and Company on the bonds of American industry that it holds.

A survey by the United Press has shown the government, since 1916 when it departed from its traditional policy of keeping out of business with the launching of the United States shipping board, has loaned or invested in American business \$3,096,329,687.01 (B). Through the Reconstruction Finance corporation, the Home Loan banks and other agencies it is ready to invest a potential \$4,568,185,514 (B) additional.

That would make an aggregate investment of \$7,664,515,261.01. To pay interest on the sum of \$306,580,806.04 annually. The national income, according to the department of commerce for the year 1930 was \$60,000,000,000 (B). The \$306,580,608.04 required for a four per cent return on the government's share in American business is one-half of one per cent of the sum.
